Your market and drill shed committee in presenting this, their final report, have very great pleasure in stating that notwithstanding the shortness of the crops of the past season, the almost impassable state of the roads during the greater part of the fall, and the extremeness of prices, that the volume of trade done at our market has been upon the whole a good average as compared with late years and fully

Excess of the business of the previous year we believe will be about half a million dollars, and we have no doubt but that with a good fair crop and good average prices the same buyers and sellers would have done a business to the amount of nearly a million dollars.

We have pleasure in stating that the sellers on the market are now beginning to avail themselves more freely of the facilities for weighing on the market scales provided by the town, and would recommend to all the advisability of using such scales.

As within the past few years there has been a great difference in the kind of articles and crops raised and grown in the surrounding country and marketed here, we would recommend that the market clerk be instructed to open columns in his statistical book for potatoes, roll butter, five pigs, sheep, rye, hay, and cordwood.

There was placed to the credit of your committee to meet current expenses for the year the sum of \$2,000; of this sum there has been accounts passed by the Council and paid by the committee amounting to \$1,316.50 which with

counts amounting to \$376.50, included in this report and recommended to be paid, makes a total expenditure of \$1,633, and leaving a balance expended to the credit of the committee of \$307.
