

The Bearbrook Murder.

On Saturday it was reported in Ottawa that a murder had occurred at Beckingham, a man named Wm. Henny shooting a constable named Morrison, who was endeavoring to arrest him. Further particulars have now been received and it appears that the affair took place at Bearbrook, in Russell county, some twenty miles from the city. The facts of the case are as follows:—About 1:30 o'clock on Friday afternoon, Morrison, who is the owner of a station, was engaged at Mr. Gilbert Nelson's, a farmer, residing two miles from his own place, when Wm. Henny and his brother-in-law, a man named Harris came up to the gate and told Morrison, who was in the barnyard, that they wanted him. Morrison replied that he would come as soon as he got through what he was at, and Henny and Harris waited. When Morrison went down to the gate Henny swore at him and dared him to arrest him now. Morrison replied, "Henny, I have no warrant to take you, and I want nothing at all to do with you." Harris made a race at Morrison for the purpose of beating him, but was caught and thrown down by a pile of logs near the gate. When Henny got to the gate he attempted to seize hold of Morrison by the legs for the purpose of throwing him down. Morrison clinched him, and while they were in this position Henny drew a revolver and shot Morrison in the left side, the ball lodging in the spine of the back. After the shooting Morrison walked from the gate to Nelson's house, two acres distant. He lay down on the sofa, but his wounds were so painful that he was carried out into the yard and laid down under a tree. A doctor was sent for and on his arrival declared that the wound was fatal. Mr. Nelson wanted to send to Ottawa for a doctor, but was told that it was no use, as nothing could save Morrison's life. This proved to be the case; he lingered on in great pain for some twenty-four hours, when death put an end to his sufferings. An inquest was held, and a verdict of "wilful murder" rendered against Henny.

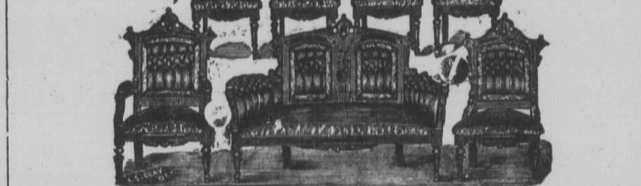
