General News.

-Dubois, the St. Alban murderer,
will be hanged at Quebec on the 20th.
-Moosomin, N. W. T. had a \$190-
000 fire the other day.

-The business portion of Colches-
ter, Connecticut, was burned last
week.

-An Australian musician has in-
vented a steam trombone that can be
heard 4 miles off.

-A man has just died in Iowa who
has lived for 90 days on nothing but
soda water.

-A Montreal ship laborer was
killed and his body terribly crushed
by a falling tub of pig iron last week.

-An Observatory will shortly be
built on the island of Madaga car 4-
410 feet above the sea level.

-Mount Etna is in a state of erup-
tion and the people in the vicinity
are alarmed.

-A census of wolves has been taken
in Russia. There are 170,000 of
them and during the past year they
killed 203 persons.

-A cyclone struck the town of
Chapel Hill the other day. Large
blocks of buildings were demolished
and several persons killed.

-The German Government is pro-
secuting plans for a wholesale pro-
secution of anarchists under the existing
anti-social law.

-The Montreal Herald's com-
positors went out on a strike, and the
management have put non-union men
in their places.

-It is now thought that the de-
struction of insects by the floods in
Iowa will more than offset the damage
done by the locusts.

-The London Times condemns the
action of the United States Govern-
ment in sending cruisers to Behring
Sea.

-During the Corpus Christi pro-
cession in Montreal, a policeman club-
bed two little protestant children who
refused to kneel when the Archbishop
passed.

-The British bark "Dianapore"
Capt. Tildmarsh, is ashore at Cape
Corriento and will probably prove a
total wreck. The captain and five of
the crew were lost.

-A young Englishman committed
suicide in Toronto on the 9th by
throwing himself from a third story
window. Nearly every bone in his
body was broken.

-Sir Edward Walker intends to
erect a tower near London that will
be higher than the famous Eiffel.
It will be 1200 feet high and cost 250
acres.

-Two cable trains crowded with
people collided in Chicago Sunday
night. Five passengers were more or
less seriously injured, but none fatal-
ly. The cause of the accident was the
grip car caused the collision.

-Toronto's 50 schools of which
the value of the sites is estimated at
\$435,230; of the buildings \$718,300
and of the fixtures \$1,375,300 making
a total of \$1,212,905. It costs about
\$225,000 to maintain the schools.

-Frederick T. McLeod, an ex-min-
ister who was found guilty of living
with a woman in Chicago, who he
had a legal wife in Nova Scotia, has
been sentenced to one year in the
house of correction at Chicago.

-In Quebec city the other day a
golden wedding was celebrated, the
ceremony being repeated with the
same groomsmen and bridesmaid as
on the first marriage, and the same
hucksterman conveyed the party to the
church.

-Harris A. Smiler, lieutenant and
bugler in the Salvation Army, has
been convicted in New York of mur-
der in the first degree. Smiler shot
and killed his third living wife in
April last.

-The British Museum received, one
day last week a Chinese bank note
issued from the Imperial mint 300 years
before the first use of paper money
in England.

-Within the past few weeks there
has been a large number of suicides
among the upper classes in Russia.
It is supposed that the frequent nihil-
ist revolutions in the higher circles have
been the cause.

-A gatekeeper of the Soldiers
Home at Washington was annoyed by
the barking of dogs near his house.
He fired a load of Buckshot in their
direction and in the morning found
that he had killed a passing citizen.

-On the west coast of Africa there
are now 200 churches, 33,000 con-
verts, 100,000 adherents, 2,750
schools and 30,000 pupils. Religious
books have been translated into 35
dialects of the section.

-The Synod of the Reformed
Presbyterian church at New York
adopted a resolution denouncing the
Chinese Restriction law as unjust and
contrary to the genius of American
institutions.

WOMEN'S COLUMN.

Conducted by the Ladies of the Sackville
W. C. T. U. in Amherst.

The W. C. T. U. and citizens of Am-
herst were favored on June 7th and
8th with a visit from Miss F. E. Wil-
lard, the honored president of the
World's White Ribbon Army. On Sat-
urday the address was for women only
in the beautiful Y. M. C. A. Hall. In
spite of the pouring rain the hall was
nearly filled to welcome one so univer-
sally known and beloved. Among the
audience were representatives from
Sackville, Parisboro, Piquash, and
other towns adjacent to Amherst. As
Miss Willard and her secretary Miss
Anna Gordon entered, all rose and gave
the Chautauque salute. All eyes were
turned with kindly interest upon the
slender woman dressed in black who takes
the place of a mother among the white
handkerchiefs.

Her face wears an aspect of earnest
steadfastness, but it also looks rather
tired and weary from her abundant
labors, but this phase only adds to its
sweet impressiveness.

Mrs. Dunlap, the President of Am-
herst W. C. T. U. presided with grace
and dignity, reading the last Psalm and
calling upon the choir to sing the hymn,
"For God and Home and Native Land."

After which Mrs. Willard led in an
earnest and appropriate prayer. The choir
sang again, and Miss Dunlap in a few
well-chosen words, warmly welcomed
the visitors and introduced her to the
audience.

A brief outline only of her address is
possible—as it occupied more than an
hour, but seemed all too short to those
who listened.

She said:—We have long desired to
meet the white-ribbon sisters in the
maritime provinces; to-day it is all won-
derful. As we pass from place to place,
we are more impressed with this
thought, now great is the conviction
of the women. Before coming out this
afternoon, two letters were handed me
one from the British Women's Associa-
tion saying that Lady Henry Somerset
is a devoted temperance advocate and
philanthropist, had been chosen presi-
dent, in the place of Mrs. Margaret
Bright Lucas, deceased. Also there
came an advertisement that I had been
elected president of the World's W. C. T. U.
According to their arrangement
Miss Gordon added a few words in
reference to work among the
young, in which she is greatly in-
terested. Many ladies handed in their
names as members of the W. C. T. U.
Sackville, June 10th.

Could politicians show such disinter-
estedness? In all nationalities where the
W. C. T. U. exists, this magnanimous
action of Canadian women will be known
and the object lesson to all who see it.
