OVERSEAS MAIL GREAT SUCCESS

C. P. R. More Than Fulfills Its Contract and Arrives at Liverpool in 29 1-2 Days—The Services Continued.

Montreal, Sept. 28.—The second westbound C. P. R. Overseas Mail passed Montreal shortly after this afternoon, carrying a goodly number of passengers and Oriental mail consisting of 228 sacks of letters and 117 packages of parcel post, the latter being a larger one than that sent by the first Overseas Mail. There were also 56 boxes of specie. The Empress of Ireland arrived at Quebec at 2:25 a.m., bringing the mails. She left Liverpool at 9:45 p.m. last Friday, 21st inst. Heavy headwinds were encountered, but notwithstanding this her speed averaged 17 1/2 knots an hour. She was only 1 1/2 days with out wireless touch with land on the voyage, and during that time was in communication with her sister ship, the Empress of Britain, bound for Liverpool. The Overseas Mail train is due in Vancouver next Tuesday morning at six, when the mails will be transferred to the C. P. R. Empress of India, which will carry them to Hong Kong and intermediate ports.

The first Overseas Mail from the Orient to Great Britain has been delivered in Liverpool by the C. P. R. Empress of Britain, which carried them from Quebec to Liverpool today at 1 p.m. They were brought across the Pacific by the Empress of India, which left Hong Kong August 20th at 4 p.m., and arrived at Vancouver six p.m., September 17th, were carried across Canada to Quebec 88 hours on the C. P. R. Overseas mail train and sent home by the Empress of Britain, which left Quebec at 1 p.m. September 1st. The time, therefore, occupied in the trip from Hong Kong to Liverpool was only 29 days 4 hours 55 minutes, or 7 hours and 25 minutes within the contract time.

NEWS FORECAST FOR COMING WEEK

Washington, D. C., Sept. 29.—The week just closed saw the last of the state conventions to name candidates for offices to be filled at the approaching election in November. From now on the campaign will be in full blast with the general interest of the country centered in the contest in New York State and in a lesser degree in Pennsylvania where the Democrats and Lincoln Republicans have combined to defeat the regular Republican organization as nominated by Penrose and his coteries. William J. Bryan will continue his tour in the south, and in other parts of the country Secretary Shaw, Speaker Cannon, Senator Beveridge and other prominent speakers will continue the political speech making.

President Roosevelt is due back in Washington the first of the week, but will hardly get settled in the White House when he will make a short trip to Pennsylvania to attend the dedication of the new state capital at Harrisburg next Thursday. His address on that occasion, it is announced, will not be of a political nature.

The end of the hot weather period is seen in the usual large number of conventions of religious, missionary, trade and other organizations, and it is also the period of many state fairs and full carnivals.

Among the notable conventions of the coming week will be those of the National Association of Retail Druggists at Atlanta, the United Irish League of America at Philadelphia, and the National Association of Postmasters at St. Louis.

The Democratic of Massachusetts will hold their state nominating convention Thursday and the Republicans will meet the day following. Governor Gulliver will be unanimously nominated by the Republicans, while the Democratic convention will be made lively by the fight of the regular organization against the candidacy of District Attorney Moran for the gubernatorial nomination.

A state primary election will be held in Georgia Wednesday for the nomination of three judges of the new state court of appeals. The regular election for state house officers takes place at the same time.

The international race for the Vanderbilt cup will be held over the Long Island course Saturday. Another event of the same day will be the launch of the armored cruiser North Carolina at Newport News.

A MAN OF THE DAY

Charles Evans Hughes, whom the Republicans of New York nominated for governor at the Saratoga convention, is a lawyer. He was born at Glen Falls, N. Y., April 11, 1862, and graduated from Columbia Law School in 1884. His subsequent career included a professorship in law at Cornell University Law School, and the active profession in New York city. Mr. Hughes is a trustee of Brown University. He declined the Republican nomination for mayor of New York. It was an attorney for the Armstrong insurance commission that Mr. Hughes gained his greatest distinction, since the publication of the proceedings of the investigation of the large insurance companies was widespread and closely followed.

WOULD SAVE \$15,000,000

Said to Have Found New Route for Transcontinental Between Quebec and Winnipeg Shorter by 400 Miles.

Ottawa, Sept. 29.—It is reported that advice have been received by the commissioners of the National Transcontinental railway from the engineers who are locating the line between Quebec and Winnipeg that they have succeeded in finding a route which will reduce the distance between these points to 1,350 miles. This is fully 400 miles less than the estimate given by Mr. Emmerson in the House last session. If this report be true it will mean a saving of at least \$15,000,000 on the estimated cost of construction.
