The annual Railroad Picnic was held last Saturday at Barnaby River. The day was fine and a large number were present. A most enjoyable day was spent.

Very cheap excursion rates are on from North Shore points to St. John on Labor Day and no doubt large numbers will embrace the opportunity to visit the St. John Exhibition.

The Moncton Athletic Association will hold a series of events for the championship of the Maritime provinces in Moncton on Sept. 1st. An interesting programme has been arranged.

We hear rumors of a number of matrimonial events in the near future in which a number of our popular young ladies and gentlemen are to be the principals. September weddings are to be very numerous this year.

The continued unsettled weather has made having very difficult and in some localities quantities of fine hay is still standing. The grain and root crops are turning out much better than was expected and there will not be the shortage of potatoes that was predicted.

We understand that plans are being made for the erection of a large and up to date lumber mill at Campbellton by the Kilgour Shive Lumber Co., Ltd. It is expected that it will be one of the finest mills in the Maritime provinces. Another large mill is being built at Mission Point. This mill was formerly owned and operated by the Miramichi Lumber Co. but was never a success in its former locality. It has been purchased by an American Co. and moved to Mission Point. It will be ready for operations next season.

After a lingering illness James McKay passed away at his home in Strathadam. He was unable to work for thirteen years, previous to his death during which time he was faithfully attended by his wife Katharine McKay. The funeral was largely attended. The pall-bearers were as follows: James Jones, James Brander, Neil Gordons, William Scott, Daniel Donovan and Martin Walsh. The deceased was sixty-five years of age.

In Amusement Features as in other directions, the St. John Exhibition opening August 20th, will certainly lack nothing.

With regard to amusements, however, the Exhibition Association certainly deserves congratulation; the galaxy of high-class, keen entertainment that will be provided, could only have been secured through the means adopted by the Association; the services of a well known amusement manager were enlisted, and that gentleman was instructed to tour Canada and the United States, with the object of engaging such of the latest, novel attractions as had been most thoroughly successful. The result has been very satisfactory.

Here are a few of the features secured:—The Original Cycle Whirl, which is justly described as "The Greatest Sensation of the Day." Some faint conception of it may be gathered from the fact that the track is only sixteen feet in diameter at the base, and twenty-two feet diameter at the top. It stands seven feet high, and is banked to an angle of 75 degrees. While circling this miniature track, the bodies of the riders lie parallel with the ground, thus apparently defying all laws of gravitation.

A race on such an exciting track, and hair-raising, yet racing takes place, and the riders will be of no mean order, as may be judged from the following names:—Frank Lawrence, champion quarter mile, Western Canada, Will Greenough, champion half mile, Western States and George Lee, Australian champion.

Then comes the Monte Myre Troupe of European Eccentrics Pantomimists, with their varied, clever performances which have won a deserved popularity in so many great centres.

White & Lamart, the contortionists, with their eccentric tumbling, hand balancing, burlesque, desecrating and laughter provoking frolic, will also be there; and lots of other splendid attractions. Altogether, the amusement features this year will surpass anything previously seen in the Maritime Provinces.

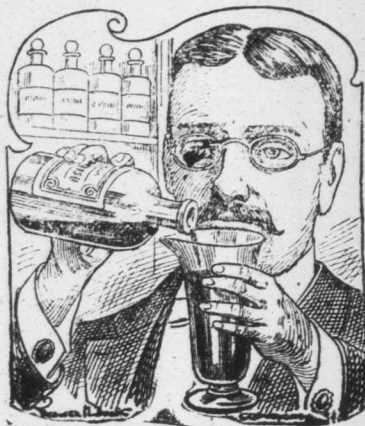
At St. Martin's, N. B., August 25th 1902, Mary Irens, only child of Walter F. J. and Mary E. Sutherland. Aged 8 months.
