Description of Christmas Day in Royal Victoria Hospital, Montreal.

CHRISTMAS TREE

Menues Served to Invalids. Some Amusing Features, Too, and a Sad One.

The following is an extract from a letter received from Miss Mary Anslow, who has been a patient in the Royal Victoria Hospital, Montreal, since early last Sept. and will no doubt be of interest to our readers. Ed.

"I must tell you about one Christmas in a hospital. It was a very quiet day for us in our Ward. Our end of the ward is always jolly. We are always laughing or singing or talking, but Sunday night a very sick child was brought in and he was here till after Christmas. His cot was right in the center at the foot of my bed, so we couldn't make any noise at all. Poor little chap, he died Wednesday night.

At six o'clock Christmas morning the nurses began their carolling in the corridors. They did not come in the ward at all, but their voices were far away, then they came closer and closer until they were almost at the entrance of the ward, then they got further and further away. It was grand and I shall never forget my Christmas here.

For breakfast we had eggs and toast. Then followed the usual routine of getting washed, combed and beds made, and dressings done. Then I had some parcels to open, and finally it was dinner time. The dinner was fine. Tomato soup, turkey, dressing, cranberry sauce, mashed potatoes and corn, then plum pudding and sauce, not too bad for invalids. I had fruit and candy here but could not eat it after such a hearty dinner.

In the afternoon the visitors came. James brought the parcel from home and Ralph some things from distant friends. At supper we had apple sauce, bread and butter and an orange. I received such numbers of presents from kind friends at home and abroad.

Now about the Christmas tree, which was Thursday. None of us expected to go, except those who could walk or go in a wheel chair, but the matron sent up word that two beds could go down from our ward. There were three of us that the head nurse wanted to go, as we had been here the longest, so what did she do but ask my doctor if I could be carefully lifted into the same bed with my chum across the way. He consented, and in fact lifted me myself. It was a tight squeeze as the other girl is fat, but we had a jolly time, and everyone laughed at us.

We had a long, long ride over to the other wing of the hospital. The Christmas tree was in a large empty ward, one hundred feet long. The tree was in the centre. At either end they had chairs for the visitors and right in the centre, near the tree, were the patients, the cots from the children's ward directly in front of the tree. The children looked sweet, their little cots were all decorated, and the wore little pink or blue jackets with wreaths of paper roses or their heads to match. The ward looked very pretty. It was decorated with flags, streamers, holly and lanterns. The tree was screened off while we had a little concert. First all the nurses sang. Then we had some instrumental music, then a few songs by a lady. It was all very nice.

Then the tree was brought to light and along came Santa Claus. He was fine too and distributed the presents and tiny bags of candy to the children. The toys were really lovely, some of the dolls were almost as large as the tots who received them. I got very nice pocket book, while other got nice shawls, combs, etc. All this was given by the Hospital, and I tell you that we enjoyed it immensely. We sang "God Save the King" and then dispersed.

It was funny going to a concert in your bed.

Well this is a long letter and I am a little tired. I am feeling well these days.

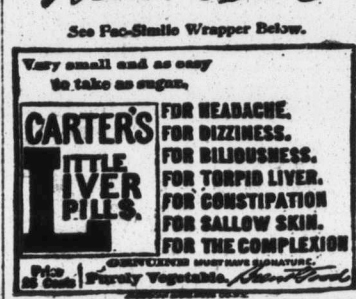

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST.

Homestead Regulations.

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres more or less.

Entry must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

(1.) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2.) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person, residing with the father or mother.

(3.) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.
