At its March meeting, the Senate unanimously resolved to confer the honorary degrees of LL.D. upon Lieutenant Governor Fraser and Attorney General Blair. Under an agreement made with the Alumni Society it is necessary to have the concurrence of that body in the conferring of the degrees, and by virtue of a bye law of the society a six months notice is \* required of the intention to confer any such degree. It is further provided that unless such notice is given the recommendation or concurrence of the society must be unanimous. In the case of the degrees above referred to, the six months notice had not been given to the society or its council, for the reason that there was not time to do so between the meeting of the senate held in March and the
