A fatal accident in connection with the P. E. I. Railway occur red at North Wiltshire on Thursday evening last. Emanuel Wedge of Borden, an employe of the Car Ferry, while trying to board the train going west, in some way got caught and fell under the wheels. One leg was cut off above the ankle and the other was badly smashed. He was taken to the Prince County Hospital Summerside. On the train doctors, who were travelling, rendered what aid they could. Shortly after reaching the hospital, the unfortunate man died. He leaves a wife and four children at Borden. He belonged originally to Mount Carmel.


