MINUTES

Of the Proceedings of the Municipal Council for the United Counties of Huron and Bruce, January, 1853.

Continued from last.

52. Accept of Mr. Rattenbury for the use of iron for the Board of Public Instruction, referred to the Finance Committee.

53. Account of Mr. Rath, Local Superintendent of Schools, referred to Finance Committee.

54. Letter from Mr. Rath, referred to School Committee.

55. Moved by Mr. Wallace, seconded by Mr. Young, That a Committee of Five be appointed on Schools—carried. On a ballot being taken, the Committee was declared to consist of Messrs. Hays, Fraser, Woods, Johnson and Holmes.

56. Moved by Mr. Hays, seconded by Mr. Gibbins, That this Council do hereby instruct their Clerk to write to Daniel Lizarz, Esq., Clerk of the Peace to furnish the Council forthwith with the number of cords of wood contracted for by him, and the cost of the same, for the purpose of warning the County Officers and Gaol since the first of January 1850—carried.

57. Moved by Mr. Girvin, seconded by Mr. Young, That the Warden be requested to lay before the Government the great difficulty the settlers on their lands (to the north) labour under for the want of a Bridge, over the Matland at the boundary line of Hullet, Colborne and Wawaosau, and request the Government to take steps to get a Bridge at the above place, it being chiefly for the benefit of the settlers on the Crown Lands—carried.

58. Moved by Mr. Fraser, seconded by Mr. Davidson, That an address be sent in the name of this Council to the Governor in Council, to open the Lake Shore Road from Goderich to Saugeen or Southampton—Carried.

59. Moved by Mr. Holmes, seconded by Mr. Hays, That the County Gaol be altered, and that the same after this hour the imprisonment under the urging of the words "The United Counties of" and in the centre the words "Huron and Bruce"—carried.

60. The Report of the Committee on Railroads was received and adopted.

61. Report of the Committee appointed to report on the Court House was received and adopted.

62. Moved by Mr. Hays, seconded by Mr. Wallace, That the salaries of the Clerks of the Peace appointed by an account of cord wood bought for the use of the County Jail and Offices be received, and referred to the Committee of Finance.

63. Moved by Mr. Davidson, seconded by Mr. Young, That the salaries of the several officers of the Municipality be taken into consideration at this sitting, and that the Finance Committee be instructed to report on the same—carried.

64. Moved by Mr. Wallace, seconded by Mr. Young, That Mr. Strachan be instructed to accept a cognovit from Messrs. Miller, Martin and Stewart, for the amount of the judgment and costs of the suit allowed to the County Council and for which a writ has been instituted against said party, Mr. Stewart having agreed to give the same—carried.

65. Report on Schools was received read and confirmed.

66. Report of the Committee appointed to report on Roads and Bridges was received, read, and referred to the Council as a whole—Mr. Girvin in the Chair, on No. 23 being read it was moved to be struck out—carried.

67. On No. 23 being read, it was moved by Mr. Flanagan, seconded by Mr. Wallace, That the Clerk be requested to issue a writ of Habeas Corpus for the recovery of the money, On the votes being taken on the above motion and Report, there voted for the motion 7, for the Report 7—the chairman gave his casting vote in favour of the motion. It was then moved in amendment by Mr. Holmes, seconded by Mr. Gibbins, That until it is certified to the satisfaction of the Council that said Bridge is built according to contract, no money order be granted for this Bridge. On the votes being taken on the above, the amendment was carried by a majority of two.

The Committee rose and the Warden resumed the chair when the Report was again submitted and adopted, as amended.

68. Moved by Mr. Holmes seconded by Mr. Fraser, That whereas a general feeling of discontent prevails throughout these Counties against what appears to be an exorbitant and disproportionate charge for the administration of Justice in comparison with other Counties in the Province, and whereas there is a probability of a New Jury Law being introduced during the present session of Parliament, and as there has been a conversation of the different Clerks of the Peace the Province held at Toronto lately—it is just that the tax payers of these Counties should be protected against any undue charges, and also against the cost of Justice towards the Public Character of the Clerk of the Peace that the above be examined into. Resolved that a Committee of three be appointed to make any enquiries that may be necessary between this time, and the next sitting of Council, and report thereon—carried. On a ballot being taken, the Committee was declared to consist of Messrs. Holmes, Wallace and Woods.

71. Moved by Mr. Hays, seconded by Mr. Gibbins, That the several officers of these Counties be requested to give such information as may be demanded in reference to the last motion, and that may be in their power to afford, either by affording documents or otherwise—carried.

72. Moved by Mr. Hays, seconded by Mr. Gibbins, That this Council instruct the Treasurer to pay money upon any accounts issued by the magistrates, unless such accounts as he is fully convinced comes within the magistrates jurisdiction to pay as magistrates, and in cases where there is any doubt on his mind, he be allowed to take legal opinion—this Council are satisfied that advantage is often taken of the magistrates or Reeves, and sums of

money that is refused to be passed by a large number of magistrates are often passed by a small number, and many things which were considered to belong to the County Council is assumed by the magistrates—carried.

73. Moved by Mr. Young, seconded by Mr. Girvin, That the Reeves of last year be requested to give their successors the statistics of their several Townships, that they may be enabled to discharge the duties of their office—carried.

The Council adjourned till 3 o'clock P. M.
