\$75,000.00 BLOCK FOR FIRST STREET

Crissell Will Erect Four Storey Building With 100 Foot Frontage.

Work will be started shortly upon what promises to be one of the finest and most substantial business blocks in the city.

It will be known as the Hub building and will cost between \$65,000 and \$75,000.

The foundation work will be completed this fall and the superstructure will be erected next spring.

Halifax, Aug. 3.—Andrew McKelvie, director of the Temiskaming and Hudson Bay Mining company, was committed for trial today by Magistrate Atkins on a charge of bribing John Piche to leave the country to avoid giving evidence in a suit brought by the attorney general to test the validity of the company's claim.

COAT TAILORS STRIKE.

Roll in Greater New York Has Reached Mark of 21,000 Strikers.

New York, Aug. 3.—By the striking of 13,000 more coat tailors in Manhattan today, the number of those out was increased to 21,000 in the greater city.

Calumet, Que., Aug. 3.—A disastrous fire broke out in Grenville village today and destroyed five business places in that village.

LAND ADJOINING THE G. T. P. CAPABLE OF PRODUCING BREAD TO FEED BRITAIN.

Montreal, Aug. 3.—The statement is made on good authority that the completed Grand Trunk Pacific, from the city of Winnipeg to Edmonton, is tributary to wheat lands capable of producing a little less than 300,000,000 bushels of wheat, or a good deal more than enough in itself without calling upon any other section of the great Canadian west to feed the British Isles in case of need.

TO ANSWER FOR FORGERY.

Reginald Bruce Committed to Fort Barracks for Trial at Red Deer.

Stettler, Alta., Aug. 3.—Reginald Bruce, of Lamerton, near Stettler, who was recently arrested in Winnipeg at the instance of the mounted police on charges of forging certain checks on Stettler merchants, was brought up in custody before W. B. Gray, J.P., at the barracks at Stettler this afternoon and committed to fort Saskatchewan to stand trial at Red Deer.

New Type of Torpedo.

London, Aug. 3.—The government is about to begin the manufacturing of the new torpedoes that are to be a great improvement over the existing type. These instruments will have a speed of about thirty knots an hour and a range of five miles.

G.P.R. to Supply Water.

Lethbridge, August 3.—The Taber town council has come to an agreement with the C.P.R. for a supply of water for the town and will install a water works system immediately.

ROYALTY AT COWES DISCUSS DIPLOMACY

King Edward and His Guest, the Emperor of Russia, Spent Day Cruising and Witnessing the Regatta Events—Conference on Matters of Diplomacy.

Cowes, Eng., Aug. 3.—King Edward, accompanied by his guest, the Emperor of Russia, spent the day cruising on his old cutter Britannia and in the meanwhile Baron Misiowski, the Russian minister of foreign affairs (Count Beckendorff, the Russian ambassador to Great Britain and Sir Edward Grey, the British foreign secretary, discussed matters of diplomacy aboard the admiralty yacht, Entchance.

The great fleet that was here yesterday has dispersed. King Edward and the czar witnessed the start of the race for the King's cup, the principal event of the regatta week as well as the competition of the fifteen motor boats. In this latter event King Alfonso's Hispania made her first appearance in English waters and took first prize by a good margin.

MONTREAL INVITES BLERIOT.

French Aviator May Be Seen in That City.

Montreal, August 3.—Bleriot may be seen in his aeroplane in Montreal. Since his successful flight across the English Channel the aviator's fame has been in everybody's mouth in the French quarter of the city. A native of France who has slight acquaintance with him, has taken the matter up and written him making an offer to finance his trip. The plan includes flights at Blue Bonnets track and a lecture on aviation in the Monument National.

TO MAKE WAR ON CRETANS.

Turkey Has Declared that Hostilities Will Be Opened.

Vicenna, Aug. 3.—Constantinople despatches today practically constitute Turkey's declaration of war in the Mediterranean. Four transports loaded with Turkish troops for the island of Crete.

Coal Sheds in Ruins.

Halifax, N.S., Aug. 3.—The coal sheds of the L. C. R., more than a dozen box cars, half a dozen coal hoppers, seven hundred tons of coal and other property of more or less value, went up in smoke this afternoon at the L. C. R. yards at Richmond. The damage is estimated at \$7,000. New coal sheds are being built at the new round house, so the loss is not serious.

AUSPICIOUS OPENING OF SASKATOON FAIR

Large Crowd, Ideal Weather, and Splendid Program Sporting and Agricultural Events—Races filled to Overflowing—One Hundred and Eleven Horses.

Saskatoon, Sask., Aug. 3.—Saskatoon's mid-summer fair was opened this afternoon by a magnificent program of sporting and agricultural events.

The racing events today, though slower classes, were filled to overflowing, the new track well equipped to start the large number of races.

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Work will be begun tomorrow upon the branch line of the G. T. P. south from Tofteld toward Calgary.

Indifferent to Revolt.

London, August 3.—The Daily Telegraph special correspondent, who has just arrived in Barcelona, sends to his paper a dispatch giving a curious picture of the indifference and ignorance the Spanish people evinced throughout his journey from the frontier, and even in Madrid, to the crisis in Barcelona.

Halifax, N.S., Aug. 3.—According to present plans of the U.M.W. executive miners of Spring Hill and Sydney mines may be called out within a week.

Japanese Delegate Stabbed Editor.

Honolulu, Aug. 3.—T. Mori, Japanese delegate from Okinawa to the Island convention of laborers, stabbed in the neck and dangerously injured Sonotora Sheba, editor of the Hawaii Shimpo, the Japanese newspaper that has strongly opposed the annexation of the islands.

MEXICO CITY BUILDINGS IN RUINS FROM QUAKE

Reports of Damage to More Than 12,000 Already Received—Will Have to Be Torn Down—Cathedral and Palace Irreparable Damaged.

Mexico City, Aug. 4.—The earthquake damage in this city is much greater than was at first thought. The building inspectors have already made reports of damage to more than two thousand buildings, and yet a considerable part of the city has not been inspected.

CHICAGO LIVE STOCK.

Chicago, Ills., August 3.—Few cattle arrived and not many buyers were in action. Only a few loads of western range cattle were available and all sold on a steady basis, sales being largely at \$5.50 to 5.85.

ORDER COMPLETELY RESTORED.

Barcelona and Madrid Quiet—Revolution is Crushed.

London, August 3.—Private and official despatches from Barcelona and Madrid indicate that order has been restored completely, except as regards Guerrilla bands in Catalonia.

TUESDAY'S GRAIN MARKETS.

Winnipeg, August 3.—Liverpool came 1/2 higher to 1/2 lower than Saturday. Exporters reported little or no business doing, but brokers stated that some wheat changed hands for October delivery.

Japanese City Destroyed.

Osaka, Japan, Aug. 4.—At 6 o'clock this morning the terrible conflagration which has reduced to ashes a large portion of this city, was under control. Up to that hour 13,000 buildings had been destroyed.

HON. WM. PUGSLEY ARRIVES IN CITY

Minister of Public Works Will Meet Local Lumbermen and City Commissioners.

Hon. William Pugsley, Federal Minister of Public Works, arrived in the city Tuesday on his private car Filigree which is now at the C.N.R. yards. Mr. Pugsley who is accompanied by Mrs. Pugsley, Miss McDonald, St. John, N.B., and his two sons, came up from the south last night.

The minister is making his first tour of the west since his appointment to a cabinet position. He has visited all the principal cities of the Western Provinces and has carefully looked into the public works now in progress or contemplated.

At Vancouver he received most convincing proof of one of the requirements of that city in the deepening of the harbor.

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Satisfactory Visit.

The result of Hon. Wm. Pugsley's visit to Edmonton has been highly satisfactory to those who have interviewed him with regard to the proposed work to be undertaken here in connection with the Federal Department of Public Works.

In connection with the bridge, the Public Works Department has ordered that the city shall lay new ties, and that the corporation has consented to do so for the privilege of using the bridge for street railway traffic.

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To Assist to Protect.

In connection with protection of the river embankment, the minister intimated that the Dominion government will give assistance to the extent of one-half or more of the total cost, if possible, however, that the city will have to pay part of the cost.

Proceedings are now being instituted to expropriate the only remaining part of the land on the frontage not owned by the city, and when this is secured the work will proceed.

The proposed east end bridge was also discussed, and Wednesday evening the minister and local lumbermen had a conference in Mr. Pugsley's car. The lumber firms, as is well known, have suffered great losses, from year to year, by being unable to take care of their season's catch of logs during flood time on the Saskatchewan river.

The local lumbermen present at the conference expressed themselves as well satisfied with the offer made to them for the protection of their timber. The storage booms will meet the necessities of the case to the entire satisfaction of all the lumber interests concerned.
