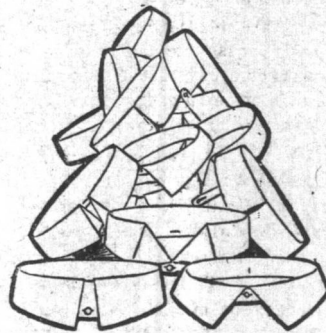

Annual Parade of the Benevolent Irish Society.

The 104th annual parade of the Benevolent Irish Society was held yesterday. In spite of the unfavorable weather and the muddy walking a fairly large number of the members attended, there being thirty more than turned out last year. The Society in charge of Vice-President Kent met at St. Patrick's Hall at 9.30 o'clock, and forming into processional order marched up town by way of New Gower Street and Patrick Street and returned by way of Water Street. The Society marched up Cochrane Street and called on His Excellency the Governor. Vice-President Kent on behalf of the Society tendered the respects of the body. Mr. Kent alluded to the celebration of the Feast of St. Patrick in a stirring speech, and giving a short history of the Benevolent Irish Society recounted the work that it was doing on behalf of the education of the boys of the city. His Excellency in replying to Mr. Kent's remarks took occasion to say that he had the pleasure of visiting the schools conducted by the Christian Brothers a short time previously and was most favorably impressed by all that he saw. He paid a warm tribute to the Irish race and alluded to the heroic way in which the Irish soldiers fought in the South African War, particularly in the siege of Ladysmith. He wished the Society a prosperous career. Cheers were given for the King, the Governor and Lady Williams, who, although suffering from the effects of a broken arm, kindly came down to the entrance of Government House to receive the Society.
