### Dead and Done For.

Yesterday we remarked the icy reception accorded to Sir Edward Morris last Tuesday at Harbor Grace, and we attributed it to the course the Premier had pursued at the Burn and St. George's Exhibitions and the intense unpopularity of the Administration. Sir Edward took occasion to speak ill of the Agricultural policy of his political opponents and to boom his own, giving much prominence to the givings-out in the different political districts. In addition to this, he reviewed the political policy of his party, gave a gross travesty of the cost of branch railway building, and appealed for a renewal of the term of office at the next general election. Here is the Premier's appeal: "And when we again seek your suffrages and support for a renewal of our term of office, we shall be able to lay before you an attractive programme which will be your vindication for again entrusting the care of the country to our control and guidance."

In his speech at the St. George's Agricultural Exhibition he made an

appeal for political support, saying:—"We intend to stand or fall by our policy two years from now. We shall not be coming to ask you for your votes merely because we are a political party, and desire another term of office; but we shall solicit your influence and support on the principle that we have acted faithfully and honestly by you, that we have been able to give a good account of our stewardship, that we have carried out our promises made to you on the eve of the last election, and that, if honoured by a renewal of our lease of office, we shall again prove true to our trust, and prove worthy of your confidence; and I am quite confident that, with your high sense of British fair play you will again honour us with your support."

As to the intense unpopularity, it is the talk of the island. Those who travel on the coastal boats frequently declare that the Government will not get in a man from Cape Spear to Cape St. John. The same story is told of the west, and the cheering for Sir Robert Bond which assailed Sir Edward Morris and Mr. Emerson at Harbor Breton is typical of the feelings in the west.

It was small wonder then that Sir Edward Morris and Mr. Blandford got the cold shoulder at Harbor Grace. Indeed, one of the strongest supporters at the last elections did not hoist any flags on his premises and shipping, and when asked about it expressed his contempt for them in language more forcible than polite. The reception given in Twillingate to the Government overtures may be gathered from a perusal of the article which we republish from the

Twillingate Sun of October 28th. This newspaper for some time past has been supporting the Morris Government, and on October 21st the editor appealed for support for the Government project.

The failure seems to have been more complete than Piccott's Saturday night culling meetings. Piccott, however, got away on a picnic and had a good time at St. Pierre. Mr. Temple, however, stayed and gave vent to his chagrin in the article we append:—

The question of an Agricultural and Industrial Fair for Twillingate in 1912 seems to have gone "bust." Candidly we had buoyed our hopes by believing that a fair number of persons would put in an appearance on Wednesday night. There are nearly forty members of the Society here and at least one would have thought over twenty would turn out. What was our chagrin to find four members of the committee assembled. There the five waited till nine o'clock without adding to their number, and what was done or decided we don't know or care. We left in disgust at the hopeless apathy of our townsmen.

A visitor here this summer when asked what he thought of Twillingate, remarked that he thought it a capital place to be dead in, and we are much of his mind.

You wonder why your young men won't stay home?  
We don't wonder for a minute, we only wonder that any of them ever come back except to be buried. Does any inhabitant of this place think that any young man with enterprise would stop here if he wasn't kept back by family, or relations, or some duty?  
For heaven's sake friends lets try and realize how dead-and-alive we are.

The patients at Fernside when last heard from were recovering.
