LONDON, Dec. 3.

British attention is fixed more steadfastly upon India and its possibilities for good and evil. As the day of the formal entrance of the King-Emperor and Queen-Empress into Delhi draws near, the value of the costliest jewel in the Imperial Crown seems doubled by the perils which some observers deem it to be exposed to, in consequence of the upheavals of nationalism in Asia. Official circles do not conceal the fact that during the last eighteen months the Calcutta administration has reported to the India Office and the Secretary of State for India, that symptoms of native unrest amongst both Mohammedans and Hindus are calculated, as Lord Crewe admitted in the House of Lords the other day, to put us in an attitude of constant watchfulness. As a result of Lord Minto's investigations on the spot, even so liberal a statesman as John Morley has announced that he no longer advocates

any reduction of the British forces in India, and admits that it would be undesirable strategy, however desirable from the viewpoint of India's burden of taxation, to leave to a vast Indian native army the preservation of order. In plain words, he does not trust the Indian potentates who will flash their jewels at the Coronation. Durbar. King George wishes his visit to begin a new era for the Indian races, and to do something towards fulfilling parliamentary pledges and royal proclamations. His ultimate objective is said to be to establish a system of compulsory education, which could be supplemented by a system of advancement for promising youths in the civil service.

BOMBAY, Dec. 3.

The King-Emperor George and the Queen-Empress Mary, as they are officially stated since arrival in their eastern empire, landed from the steamer Medina yesterday. They were met by the Governor of Bombay and a large gathering of high officials in the civil and military service. They proceeded to a huge amphitheatre opposite the landing stage, which was

filled with the thousands who came to welcome their Majesties. The scene was a brilliant one. Handsome levee dresses, official uniforms of the naval and military officers, and the gorgeous toilettes of women, only served to emphasize the gorgeous splendour of the ceremonial attire of the Indian chieftains. Behind these was massed an immense throng of Hindus, Mohammedans, Parsees and Arabs. Addresses of welcome were presented by the Municipality and other bodies, which His Majesty replied to. The royal procession subsequently formed a mile in length. It comprised representatives of all branches of the European and Native armies of India. The streets were gaily decorated and the huge crowds heartily acclaimed their Majesties.

CHARLOTTETOWN, P.E.I., Dec. 3.

Premier Palmer and the members of the Executive Council have resigned. It is likely that Mr. Matheson, leader of the Opposition, will be called on to form a ministry.

NANKING, Dec. 3.

The Tartar city was sacked and burned to-day by permission of the authorities. Business has been resumed and trains are now running between Shanghai and Nanking. The Imperialists have evacuated Pukow.

TEHRAN, Dec. 3.

Ten thousand men, with the inscription "Death or Independence" on their banners, marched to the American legation to-day and appealed to the Minister to urge his Government to support the American principles of fair play and love of justice. The English community here is aroused against Sir Edward Grey. They think that Shuster, the Treasurer-General of Persia has outplayed him by revoking the appointment of Englishmen, to which Grey objected. British correspondents here are making very plain in their despatches that they believe the British Foreign Minister is ruining the prestige of his countrymen by a course which might be regarded as laughable if it were not tragic.
