Child Dies From
Exposure.

The news of the death from exposure of a little boy named Shepard, who went berry picking with four of his companions recently, comes from Carmanville.

The five lads, the eldest of whom was but 10 years old, left their homes for the woods in the morning, and were overtaken by a storm. As they had not returned up to 4 o'clock in the afternoon, a search party was organized. The men of the village spent the whole night scouring the woods, but without success. At 10 o'clock the next morning four of the lads were found in an exhausted condition, and the youngest of the five, a child of 5 years, was found dead some distance away. The surviving four children, who had such a narrow escape from death, are now rapidly recovering.

Fishery Reports.

Sept. 19th.—From W. White (Port Rexton to Trouty).—The total catch is 8,480 quintals and for last week 6,230. The trap fishery is over but 50 dories and skiffs are still operating. Seven bunkers for squid and thirteen schooners from the Straits and Labrador have arrived. The Shore and Labrador fisheries are fair. A little is being taken during moderate weather but bait is very scarce. The Labrador schooners are returning with very good voyages and report other vessels with fair fares.

Sept. 19th.—From J. Camp, (Push-through to Cape La Hune).—Only a few dories and skiffs have arrived from the Straits or Labrador. Prospects are not good and only very little squid is obtainable for bait.

Sept. 19th.—From S. E. Chafe, (South Head of Brigus to Bay Roberts Point).—The total catch is 1,110

quintals and for last week 260. Fifty

boats, punts and skiffs are fishing. Prospects are not very bright. Herring is fairly plentiful for bait, but squid is scarce. The fisherman say if squid could be had some cod would be taken every day. The schooner Constance, Capt. Morgan, of Port de Grave, has landed 200 qts. caught at Petty Harbor. This is included in the quantity landed to date.

Notes From
Pleasantville.

Yesterday afternoon a squad of the Volunteers went county, and engaged in skirmishing and marching in double quick time. The lads, who had their rifles with them, covered the different hills and woods from Virginia to the top of Signal Hill.

There are now 600 volunteers all told under canvas. From that number those required for foreign service will be picked. The work of selecting will begin next week.

While the Volunteers were going through some various evolutions yesterday at the camp grounds some excellent photos of them were taken.

When finished both masts will be 250 feet high. Mr. Payne, engineer in charge of the erection staff, is here and at present has fourteen men employed and expects to complete the job in about two months. No shipping in sight. Bar. 29.40; ther. 52.
