"Humiliated?" said the other woman. "Why should I feel humiliated? I have done nothing to be ashamed of."

She should feel ashamed of having treated me slightly, not I. If I were rude to her now, then I might have some reason for shame, but no one can humiliate me but myself."

As I listened I thought of something I read in a magazine the other day:

"I'm ridiculous in this way, Jane," said the strange boarder. "I'm a lot interested in what I do myself but I can't seem to get so interested in what other people do to me. I can't make it seem to myself that it's very much my affair, you see. Seems to me that's their affair."

I do not believe there is any great truth of which we lose sight more easily than this—that the things that really count in our lives are the things we do ourselves and not the things that others do to us.

At the College Hall.

The Rev. C. A. Whitemarsh, M. A., preached at both services in the College Hall yesterday. At the morning service the reverend gentleman outlined the attitude of the Methodist Church of Canada and Newfoundland on the Temperance question as based on the report just published, which states that the liquor traffic is antagonistic to the work of the Church of God and to the onward march of the Kingdom of Jesus Christ, and that it is also antagonistic to the highest interests of the British nation. The preacher spoke strongly on the question of prohibition and intimated that during the next few months he would place this all important matter before his congregation for their consideration. The subject of the evening's discourse, was: "Winning Life's Supreme Prize is Life's Supreme Business," based on the text: "I Press Toward the Mark for the Prize."

S.S. Carleton Arrives

FROM MONTREAL.
The S. S. Carleton reached port yesterday afternoon from Montreal direct, after a five days passage. She brought a full general cargo, being fitted on deck as well as below, including ten thousand barrels of flour and eighty tons of machinery and material generally for the Dominion Lumber Company to be put in the new Nova Scotia Bank which is to be erected in the O'Dwyer Block, Water Street. The Carleton left Montreal on Tuesday last and did not have to contend with any ice coming down the river. She is the first boat, coming this way, to come down the St. Lawrence since navigation opened this season. The Carleton is now discharging at the Purves Wharf pier. The next boat to come down the river is the Sindbad, leaving Montreal sometime to-day.

Meeting of R.C. Citizens

A largely attended and representative meeting of the Roman Catholic citizens of the city took place at the Cushe Theatre yesterday afternoon to discuss the matter of an address and presentation to His Grace the Archbishop-Elect.

Hon. J. D. Ryan briefly outlined the object of the meeting, and moved that Hon. John Harris take the chair which motion was carried by acclamation. Mr. John Barron was chosen as Vice-Chairman, Mr. P. J. Summers as Secretary and Mr. W. J. Ellis as Treasurer.

Hon. Mr. Harris then addressed the large gathering present, and after paying a tribute to the Archbishop-Elect, informed them of the expense that was attached to the functions attendant upon the acceptance of the office. He expressed the hope that the expense would be borne by the laity of the Archdiocese as an appreciation of the favour conferred on them in having a Newfoundland appointed to the vacant See. He also suggested the presentation of an illuminated address by the laity, and asked that a committee of one hundred with power to add to their numbers, be appointed to assume the responsibility of carrying out the wishes of the Catholic community in honouring the Archbishop-Elect. Resolutions to this effect were then moved and adopted, the speakers being Rt. Hon. Sir E. P. Morris, Messrs. J. M. Kent, M. W. Furlong, K. C. W. R. Howley, K. C. P. J. Summers and W. J. Ellis. The executive was empowered to nominate the committee which will meet at a later date. The Chairman then announced that subscriptions would be received by Rev. J. McDermott, Administrator, Rev. J. P. Phipps, St. Patrick's and Rev. Dr. Kitchen, St. Joseph's. Before the close of the meeting a subscription list was opened, the amount realized being about \$2,000.

"During the meeting a letter from Mr. Justice Emerson was read expressing his inability to attend and promising hearty co-operation in anything undertaken by the meeting."
