The consecration service is indubitably the most solemn, the most stirring, most significant and most majestic of all the alluring pageant of the artistic liturgy of Holy Church. The coronation of a Pope, the crowning of a King, the benediction of the most colours, are glorious affairs, but they are but meagre compared to what we have just witnessed. This is a portrayal by outward grandeur of inner sublimity and the tremendous power of the Episcopal Office, the high dignity of its occupant.

What then does this wondrous sacrament rise stand for? What does it denote and signify? What in a word is bishop?

Indeed, to present a simple answer may proceed to deduct it from a survey of what Cardinal Manning calls the temporal mission of the Holy Ghost to the World.

The eminent and illustrious consecrated addressed the Episcopal candidate with the words "Accipe Spiritum Sanctum"—Receive the Holy Ghost—these creative words he suited to the marvelous action, the act of the laying on of hands. He placed his hands upon him and sent him away by such physical contact another link to the ever lengthening chain of temporally unending chain of succession of Apostolic Orders.

As similar to and coincident with an act that happened two thousand years ago. He who laid on his hands had laid hands laid up and so could the action be traced back to those Apostolic days when we read in the Sacred text of the Holy Ghost said to them, "I am with you and I have taken them. They then, fasting and praying, imposing their hands upon them went their way." Likewise to one endowed with Apostolic power, the separated Edward Patrick laid his hands upon him and sent him away to his labors. What a indisputable and authoritative act of Christ has been thus, established.

For the work of the Holy Spirit, the new Archbishop was consecrated. The Saviour had promised His Abiding Spirit to His Church, and when He had returned to His Father after the ransom which completed His earthly mission, He fulfilled that promise and sent the Person of the august Trinity to be the guide.

## His Grace Archbishop Roche Consecrated To-Day

St. Paul in his epistle to the Ephesians points out the twofold object of the Pentecostal descent, that is to say for the building up of the body of Christ, the synonym of the church, and the building up the same unto charity. Cardinal Newman put it in other words when he wrote that the first mission of the paraclete was to guard revelation and the first proper charity. To guard revelation in order to preserve intact, unchanged the secure, whole deposit of faith once delivered to the saints, charity in order to group divergent men together into diocesan units so that neighbourly love should result and fraternal forbearance ensue.

The function of this morning emphasizes in no uncertain way that dual endeavour of the Divine Sanctifier, and the new Archbishop, will demonstrate it likewise as he evolves his episcopal programme. The rite has assuredly emphasized that unique and united guardianship of revelation implied in the continuity of orders, which secures the venerable traditions of all the Christian ages. The presence of the Apostolic Delegate is an added illustration, for he is the immediate representative of the Primate of Christendom whose jurisdiction has been partially delegated here. It brings the newly consecrated metropolitan in close touch with the noble race of Roman Pontiffs, the successors of the Prince of the Apostolic College, whose line from St. Peter to Benedict has never been broken. That line whose historic fact is outstanding and whose explanation must be divine. Men of the schools of Huxley and Harnack have been unable to find a human reason for its existence and they have failed who can find one? Forces immense and subtle, physical and moral have many a time attempted to penetrate and destroy the thin white line of Pontiffs and to pillage the sacred deposit committed to its custody but unavailingly. Like the granite ribs that bind securely the natural upheavals, that go to make up the material of the eternal mountains, so does the apostacy joined with the papacy strongly circumscribe that colossal disintegration of revelation that constitutes Mt. Sion the mystic mountain of the Lord. That the custodian should be efficient for his school the despatching cry of overwhelming desire, "Thou has conquered, Oh Pale Galilee, the world has grown grey with thy breath," with a slight change of a word, he might have as truly addressed the Papacy of whose power bishops are particularly pants and say "Thou hast conquered, oh great magisterium—oh great teaching office, the world has grown grey with thy breath."

United with the Holy Father, the Supreme Apostolic authority, the new Archbishop will build up the Newfoundland portion of the Holy Church in the unity of faith. He will keep the church like the milk-white bind of the poem, without unspotted, innocent within and he will see that she will feed on the lawns where flourish the succulent and nutritious herbs of sound doctrine and growth in holiness. And thus there will be effected through him the preservation and the presentation of what has been revealed through the sacred scriptures and venerable tradition and accordingly the first part of his office shall be consummated.

The other mission permeating the Holy Spirit's influence on the children of men is the sweet mission of the propagation of charity, the celestial labour of love. This service openly suggests it, for in this noble edifice gathered representatives of the whole Island to show filial affection for a spiritual father commissioned from on high to bind them together in the bond of peace. The message of love from apostolic days has been insistent and perpetual. It was the mark of the early Christian communities, the concord of their communities differentiated them from all others. "See these Christians how they love one another" was the edified comment of their pagan contemporaries. It was this beneficent charity that the church utilized in the ages of faith to bring hating elements together to weld them into a harmonious people such as she did with the Saxons and Normans in England. When that most awful curse of divided Christendom succeeded, the pacific policy of papal arbitration was practically nullified and with dire results to civilization founded on the principle of Him who commanded, "I say

love one another." It was the gentle Leo who with his charming personality created by Christian asceticism subjugated Attila, the Hun. The modern world is grossly material, the survival of the fittest is its motto, its religion is only a thin veneer. Charity, brotherly love, sympathy, justice and right are for it delusion, there is no God if you like ascended from the beast and is only a beast. This is really the cause of the international murder in the fields of Europe to-day. It is not like chivalrous fights of other times, where men fought for honour or for land, this is a war to the finish. It is the struggle of brute force for the survival of the fittest. To attain its object blood will flow in torrents, incalculable treasure will be lost, and human misery such as the world has never known will be the appalling price of its issue. To mention peace and charity now does indeed seem a hollow mockery, but the world will soon be staggered and will cry with an unanimous voice for a peace which the world cannot give, but which God and the practice of religion can supply. Even now among those who are defending our country and our honour with a gallantry that moves us to admiration we hear the call for the unseen world which gives a gallantry in danger; and in the Empire at large there is a feeling of the triviality of common objects, pursuits and desires in comparison with the call of duty and brotherhood.

Already the Holy Father has spoken a word of peace and his word has been respected by Catholics and non-Catholics alike and many look to him as the saving plank in what looks mightily like the shipwreck of Christian civilization. The new Archbishop then will have Christian charity the energizing principle of his episcopate. He will urge his faithful flock to love their King, their neighbours and their duty, and to beware of the age whose mentality is godless, individualistic and self-indulgent. He will be the exemplar himself and shall love all in all conditions.

It may happen that in the course of his labours he will raise up material monuments in stone and marble, but time will crumble those. If he wills a monument perennials, let him build up the body of Christ, the living temple, the living head in the clouds; but it is in the every day life that nearly all the world's best work is done. The pale mountain peaks lift their glittering heads into the clouds; but it is in the lowly plains that harvests grow and fruits ripen on which millions are fed. So it is not from the few conspicuous deeds of life that the blessings cheerfully come which make the world better, sweeter, happier, but from the countless, lowly ministrations of the everyday, the little acts of kindness and love that fill long years, for the work men do is not their test alone, the love they win is far the better chart and may that be the chart of the archbishop.

What therefore is a Bishop? A Bishop is one endowed with the plenitude of the priestly orders with supreme jurisdiction in his diocese to feed the sheep and lambs of his flock within the enclosure demarked by revelation and overshadowed with the atmosphere of charity.

And now I turn for a brief moment to a personal reference. Edward Patrick Roche is the eighth Bishop in line of succession of St. John's, and the second Primate of the Archdiocese. The "New Freeman" of June 26th, says:—

"Whether it be true or not that Mr. Roche is the youngest Archbishop in the Catholic hierarchy" says some of our Catholic papers have said, it is quite true that he is comparatively a young man, but Rome always looks rather to merit, prudence and capacity than to the mere accident of advanced years, and even if the new Primate has not great maturity of years, the Holy See believes that he has maturity of judgment and is the most mature. The other "maturity" is arriving every day. But of all Newfoundlanders none do well for a name to have foreseen the event of next Tuesday than the late venerated Archbishop Howley, whose presence and friendship Mr. Roche had been during the last eight years of Archbishop Howley's life, and when that noble-souled prelate and most eminently gifted of Newfoundland's patriotic sons was leaving this world for the Eternal Shores he must have felt consoled by the fidelity, wisdom and affection of his Vicar General, Mr. Roche.

We unite with his devoted clergy and people in wishing Heaven's choicest blessing on Archbishop Roche.

## DRINK MILK FOR FLESH.

The milk diet is the best flesh producer I know of. The day you commence the diet drink a couple of glasses of hot water upon arising, and fifteen minutes later eat half a dozen prunes which have soaked all night in a tumbler of warm water. Also drink the prune juice. Fifteen minutes after this take a glass and a half of milk and thereafter every hour until four or four thirty in the afternoon. Eat your evening meal as usual, letting it consist of plainly cooked foods.

Do not drink the milk hurriedly, but remember it is just as much a food as beefsteak and requires the same amount of chewing. Swish the milk around in the mouth before swallowing as in this way it is almost

entirely digested before it reaches the stomach. While on this diet be sure that the eliminative organs function properly.

Do not take the milk too cold, but let it stand until the chill is off and it is pleasant to take. Also do not take the milk too close to bedtime. Rather get up a little earlier in the morning so you can commence taking the milk earlier. The first week take three or three and one half quarts of milk, the second week five quarts, and the third and succeeding weeks at least six quarts.

For the first week take two glasses of hot water an hour before retiring. The second week drink a glass and a half of milk every hour during the day. Continue the hot water and prunes as directed for the first week, but omit the evening meal this week and the weeks following. The third week take two glasses of milk every hour during the day and continue the hot water and prunes.

## YOUR BOYS AND GIRLS

The care of baby's clothing is as important. It must be kept scrupulously clean, and washed with clean water and pure white soap. Diapers should not be dried and then used a second time. Directly they are removed they should be dropped into an enameled or stone pail of water, kept for the purpose and washed out every day. Flannels carelessly washed will inflame tender skin. Slips not properly rinsed in washing will irritate the flesh at neck and wrist and under the arms.

In hot weather a baby should be dressed according to comfort. A cotton short should be substituted, for wool, and a knitted belly band of cotton for the woolen one. The baby, winter or summer, that perspires, is over-dressed.

The restless baby should have night gowns with shaped feet. And all babies should have blankets of their own soft and light in weight.
