THE DEVONSHIRES SAIL.

QUEBEC, July 19. Canada's farewell to the Duke and Duchess of Devonshire, this afternoon, was a most impressive affair. The Governor General and Vice Regal Party boarded the Empress of France at 4 o'clock.

THE ATTITUDE OF ULSTER.

LONDON, July 19. Irish negotiations appear to have reached a deadlock in so far as they concern a tripartite conference between Mr. Lloyd George, Eamonn De Valera and Sir James Craig. This developed last night when Sir James, as he departed for Belfast, issued his statement on the subject of "Self-Determination", which is interpreted to mean that he will not compromise on any matters pertaining to Ulster's political status. In many quarters it is not accepted as final and hope is expressed that negotiations for such conference are not yet ended. In commenting on Sir James's statement that "Ulster's autonomy must be derived from an all Irish Parliament, sitting at Dublin. Several of this morning's papers assert that if this attitude is persisted in, all negotiations must break down; while others advance the belief that if the present Conference fails, Parliament may be dissolved and the issue be submitted to the British people in a general election.

WHAT COLONEL SPENDER SAYS.

BELFAST, July 19. The return of Sir James Craig and the members of his Cabinet from London must not be taken as a rupture of negotiations for Irish peace, it was declared to-day by Colonel Spender, Secretary of the delegation, on its arrival here. It is thought indeed that the delegation will be recalled to London next week. Eamonn De Valera is regarded by Ulster Unionists as visionary, and the feeling in Unionist circles here is that discussion among all the parties concerned in an Irish settlement will be impossible until he considerably modifies his position.

ALBERTA ELECTION RESULTS.

CALGARY, July 19. Farmers have swept Alberta. Present returns make it certain that the nominees endorsed officially by the United Farmers of Alberta have been elected to at least 26 of 61 seats in the Legislature of the Province, involving defeat of the Liberal Government, headed by Hon. Charles Stewart. The Liberal group will number not more than fifteen. Labour elected four, and these can be added to the voting strength of the forthcoming farmers' administration. Four Independents were elected, and one Independent Conservative. Three of Premier Stewart's six cabinet colleagues were defeated. Two women were elected on the Government ticket, Mrs. Nellie McClung and Mrs. Walter Paribby.

HUGE OIL FIRE.

LINDEN, N.J., July 19. Loss from a fire which last night and to-day destroyed 33 of the 34 oil tanks and 15 asphalt stills at the plant owned by Warner Quinlan Asphalt Company, near here, was estimated at three million dollars to-day, by officials of the Company. The entire plant was ruined with the exception of several small structures. Three hundred thousand barrels of oil were burned, much of it flowing over the nearby meadows and water and endangering shipping. Firemen estimated to-day that some of the oil might continue to burn for days, while now under control.

KORFANTY IN PARIS.

PARIS, July 19. Adalbert Korfanty, Polish patriot and insurgent leader, arrived here on Monday for a visit of several days, the purpose of which he did not reveal.

PREMIER MEIGHEN DETAINED.

LONDON, July 19. (By Gratton O'Leary, Canadian Press Staff Correspondent)—As the result of an important communication sent to Washington yesterday, it may be necessary for Premier Meighen of Canada to remain in London until August 4th, it was learned to-night. The communication is confidential, but is believed to be connected with the desire of the British Government to hold a preliminary Conference on Pacific problems in London, before the main gathering is called to take place in Washington.

AMERICAN STEAMER ON ROCKS.

YARMOUTH, N.S., July 19. The American steamer Birmingham, three days from Boston for Riga, Russia, with general cargo, went ashore on Gannett dry ledge, fifteen miles from Yarmouth, this morning, in a thick fog. Her crew and Capt. M. L. Gilbert, came safe ashore in the ship's boats at Chebogue Point. When they left the vessel two of her holds were flooded and there was six feet of water in the engine room. Little hope is held out that the vessel may be salvaged.

KIDNAPED MAGISTRATE RELEASED.

CORK, July 19. Magistrate Patrick Brady, who was kidnaped by unknown armed men, from his residence in Bally Lickey, West Cork, on July 6, was released. His captors brought him to a spot near his home in a motor car. Magistrate Brady was one of the witnesses of the killing of Canon Magner, Parish Priest of Dunleavy, in December last, by Cadet Harte, who later was found guilty of murder but was adjudged to have been insane at the time the crime was committed.




