A Solution of the European Problems Within Sight

The announcement by Premier Herriot that a defensive pact between Britain, France and Belgium is assured in the event of a premediated attack by Germany will do much to allay apprehension in France and to prepare the way for a final settlement of the outstanding Europeon problems.

The Allied Conference which July will meet under auspicious circumstances, and with a cut and dried plan to consider in the ready signified their approval of being considered. the recommendations, and with a solid front presented by Britain. France and Belglum, Germany may at last be forced to realize that further evasion of her obligations will avail her St. Michael's nothing, and may in fact lead to more drastic measures on the part of the Allies.

The participation of the United States in the Conference hardly is to be expected that America, on the eve of an elecpolicy so utterly at variance with successful on record. that which she has followed ever since her repudiation of the Treaty of Versailles.

The New U.S. **Immigration** Regulations

In connection with the strong feeling which has been aroused in Japan owing to the exclusion of her people from the United States under the new Immigration Regulations, a point which has been somewhat overlooked is that the Regulations do-not apply exclusively to Japan, but

to practically all Asiatics. The United States has discovered that the "melting pot" theory, based upon the idea that the surplus populations of other countries could be absorbed and fused into a new and homogeneous people, does not work out in practice. In consequence the principle of selection was adopted, which drastically reduces the immigration from Southern and Eastern Europe, practically excludes the Asiatic, and gives the preference to the peoples of Northern and Western Europe.


