

THE EXTENT OF THE DOMINION. —The transfer of the Hudson's Bay territory to the Dominion of Canada will considerably affect the relative position of the latter among the coun-tries of the world, as may be seen from a few highly important facts which we-take from "The American Yearbook " and " National Register." The valuable table of comparative sta-tistics in this work shows that Brit-ish North America, when united, will be in point of area, the fifth country of the universe, being only exceeded by the Russian Empire, the Chinese Empire, the remainder of the British Empire and the United States. In point of population, it is as yet only the 28th among the political divisions of the world, but-as shown in anoth-er place of the Yearbook_—if the rate of increase continues in 1961, or in less than a hundred years from to-day, will be \$0,000,000. alone suffice to foreteil the future fate of British North America. COTTON OPERATIVES IN ENG-LAND.—The papers show a bad state of affairs in the manufacturing dis-tricts. During Friday and Saturday last 1,500 were relieved at the Black-burn office, and during the five pre-vious days there was an average of eighty per day. Gloomy and distress-ing accounts of the homes of the oper-atives are given by those in the habit of visiting, and the prospect not reassu-ring. There is a tendency in favour of emigration among the operatives, nearly sixteen thousand of them will be thrown out of work, the masters having fully made up their minds to abide by their original decision. It is distinctly stated that the bulk of the masters are, and have for some time been, losing money. No six of them, it is said, are working to a profit, manufacturing property has become a drug, and there are some 'mills in the town which cost upwards of £40,000 sterling, which are in a good condition, but which cannot be held for anything like half that amount. All those mills making cloth, gray shirtings, &c., for the Indian market, are losing money on account of the depressed state of business in that country, and at present there is not the sightest sign of an improvement.
