

HINDUS ARE NOW OUT FOR RIGHT TO VOTE

Every Possible Influence Will be Brought Into Play

Vancouver, May 4.—That every possible influence will be brought to bear by the Hindus in British Columbia to secure for themselves from the government of Canada the full and untrammelled rights of British subjects is the statement made by the local leaders of the movement, which was inaugurated last Sunday in the appointment of delegates to carry their wishes to the foot of the throne.

Just how strong the Hindus consider their case and what they mean when they demand "all the rights of British subjects," may be judged by the stand taken by one of their local leaders today.

"Do we seek the privilege of the franchise? Why, certainly. There are two main points in the matter we are now commencing. One is for the right to proceed without any restrictions from any one part of the British Empire to any other part, and the other is our right to enjoy every privilege enjoyed by any other Britisher in whatever portion of the empire we choose to reside."

That is the sentiment thrown down to the Federal authorities at Ottawa and the struggle is to be fought to the end in the Imperial Parliament, with the lawyers of the Empire as judges.

Yesterday Naranga Singh, an educated Hindu capitalist, and owner of real estate in this city, was refused landing on Canadian soil when he sought to enter the Dominion from the Seattle boat, his exclusion being effected under the immigration regulations which require the newcomer to arrive by direct ticket from the land of his birth or citizenship. But Naranga Singh is coming again, and tomorrow he will seek or attempt to step from the Seattle boat in a second effort to land in British Columbia. The Hindus anticipate that he will be stopped again and they have all preparations made for another, and more strenuous legal battle than the one which took place over the Nether Ram case, by the decision in which the Hindu was deported across the Pacific.

While this fresh test is being made of the immigration regulations, the battle is to be carried on actively elsewhere and to make arrangements for further efforts to attain the goal of their ambitions, the Hindus will gather again next Sunday. At this meeting native spokesmen with English educations will be appointed to interview Attorney-General Bower to secure his views on their case and, if possible, they will enlist the Provincial cabinet members on their side as a pleader of their cause at Ottawa and in London.

How far-reaching is the movement and what force is going to be brought to bear on the powers interested to secure its success is revealed by another significant statement that was made today by one of the prominent native of India in the city. Before the end of the summer, he says, native members of the vice-regal council of India will be in British Columbia to secure full and detailed statistics on the points involved, after which they will carry the plea of their countrymen on this side of the water to the heart of the Empire for presentation before the authorities there.

Only statesmen actively engaged in public life will be enlisted in the fight and the entire movement will be carried through without any appeal to native princes of India. Therefore, taking this view, the Hindus on this coast attach no political significance to the approaching visit of the Gaekwar of Baroda, who, though he will receive a hearty welcome from his countrymen as a compliment to himself and the exalted position he holds, will not be asked to take any stand on the subjects which are now being brought to issue.

TREASURE HUNT IN PERU WAS PLANNED

Expedition, However, is Delayed by Arrest of Leader in Seattle.

Seattle, May 4.—Well formulated plans for an expedition into the wilds of Southern Peru were knocked away on Friday by the arrest, on charges of larceny, of H. J. Thompson, captain and leader of a band of adventurers who were fitting up the schooner Yida at West Seattle for a journey to Callao. Thence through the stretch of sand dunes that adorn the Peruvian coast for sixty miles inland they intended to penetrate to rocky fastnesses beyond. Search for gold and the operation of an industrial colony of miners on a co-operative basis was the object of the treasure hunters.

Thompson was in the country four years ago and found nuggets in a purling stream that winds down from the mountains 150 miles in the interior. His prediction to give sufficient advice, however, resulted in his detention and postponement of the journey. Thompson, it is charged, furnished R. L. Langley, a barber in the Hotel Butler, with a list of eight things which it is best to avoid. Every paragraph in his letter to Langley started with the word of advice, "Don't."

Thompson refuses to divulge the exact location of his treasure laden stream, but speaking generally, it is tributary of a big river, and there are no unusual difficulties to be encountered.

The streams teem with fish, the country abounds in game and there is a luxuriant growth of every kind of wild fruit, such as bananas, alligator pears, guavas, coconuts and even oranges. We expected, of course, to make the country furnish us with meat. There are many deer and a goodly number of bears and mountain sheep in the country. There also are many wild llamas, but it is not good policy to kill these, as they make excellent food of burden, and are much used by the natives.

To destroy them might lead to unpleasant complications with the natives. A llama is capable of carrying as much as 100 lbs. of freight as an ordinary pack horse, and is much better equipped by nature to climb the mountains.

"The Indians of Peru are docile and extremely hospitable under ordinary circumstances, but are very ready to resort to wanton destruction of game or other natural resources of the country in which they live."

SHUBERTS CONTROL THE SITUATION NOW

Theatrical Syndicate Batten from the Northwest by "Open Door."

Seattle, May 4.—A special to the Post-Intelligencer from New York this morning says:

The Messrs. Shubert & Co. have entered into a business arrangement with John Cort, who controls all the theaters in the northwestern part of the Pacific Coast, numbering more than 100, whereby John Cort has adopted the policy of the "open door," the one for which the Shuberts have been fighting for more than a year. This policy has been adopted by Julius Cass and his circuit of 200 theaters throughout New England, and M. Ries and his circuit of 100 theaters in New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Maryland and New Jersey. Under the management of Messrs. Shubert & Co., their attractions will be shown for the first time on the Pacific coast in several years.

Part of the agreement with Mr. Cort is to the effect that he shall be supplied with thirty first-class attractions at once. This arrangement was immediately complied with by Messrs. Shubert & Co., including William Mackay, J. B. McKim, John M. Brady, C. Whitney and Daniel V. Arthur and in the next two weeks their unparalleled strong line of attractions will move towards the Pacific Coast. This is the first time in the history of theatricals on the Pacific coast that any line of attractions of this magnitude has ever been presented in their theaters. The independent forces therefore are now in a position to cover the entire territory of the United States with their attractions from coast to coast, as they have access to all the theaters in the different circuits both East, West, North and South.

The supremacy of power in the theatrical business has been wrested from the hands of theatrical syndicate and the Klaw & Erlanger booking agency. It is no longer for the syndicate or the Klaw & Erlanger booking agency to dictate to managers what attractions they shall book. Through their opposition to the "open door" policy, they have now placed themselves in the position of not finding room for their own attractions in the different circuits mentioned here, as they have declared their refusal to play them with the Cort, Coim, and Ries circuits. The activity of the theatrical syndicate will be confined during their next season to week stands in which they have booking contracts.

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COURT IS REQUESTED TO PROVIDE A WIFE

Novel Application Causes Some Amusement When Read in Kansas Criminal Court

Kansas City, Kan., May 4.—The deliberations of the criminal court were interrupted a few days ago by a letter carrier who handed Judge Latschaw a special delivery letter. On the envelope was written "Haste," "Personal" and "Confidential."

The stern look on the judge's face changed to a smile as he read the first few lines of the letter. It was a formal application which Fred M. Miller, an attorney, desired to file with the court to have his name placed on the list of desirable men who ask the court to find them wives.

It was the first application of the kind ever filed in the criminal court in Jackson county, and the only explanation Judge Latschaw is able to give of Miller's reasons for filing the application is that he thought a woman in jail and anxious to get out would be the most likely person to consent to marry him.

"Here is a man who desires to prefer a charge against himself in the criminal court of wanting to get married," Judge Latschaw said. "File the application, Mr. Clerk. Enter a plea of guilty after his name and sentence him to be married to the first woman who will consent to be his wife. Proceed gentlemen."

In the letter Miller says he has practiced law in Southern Kansas for several years, and now is a lecturer. He inclosed a stock handbill, marked

"Exhibit A," which announced that he will lecture on "Truth," "Morality" and "What's the Use?" In the handbill he admits he is a "noted and eminent orator and diligent and convincing speaker." He refers the judge to A. M. Jackson, Winfield, Kan.; Francis M. Brady, Olathe, Kan.; W. E. Sapp, Galena, Kan. He says he is in Kansas City preparing lectures on Ingersoll and Napoleon.

Desirable Qualities
"For my wife the lady must be grand; she must be well bred, and refined, and she must be modest and of good character." Miller said in the letter which accompanied the formal application. "She must be loving and true, ambitious and intelligent, and she must be willing to aim and aspire to reach the highest plane in life, and the most lofty limit of thought. For up there is where I will take and keep and hold her forever."

"It is only in the last resort that I now make this appeal. I assure you, I am a thoroughly honorable, noble and capable man. I am thirty-five years old, and a Kansas Democrat. I am a speaker and lawyer of high-class attainments and ability. I am a very 'jolly' man, and have felt the great need of the cheer and companionship of a high-class, intelligent and aspiring young woman for a wife."

Mr. Miller's formal application in court form, in part, is as follows: "In the criminal court of Jackson county, in re the matter of Fred M. Miller, 'jolly' man," in search of a wife.

"Now comes Fred M. Miller, applicant and petitioner herein, and represents to the court that he is a single man, inspired with the lofty ambition to become a married man. That after fifteen years of faithful and diligent search after the love and affection of a woman, with his own love and affection ever ready to cost at the feet of the first one who showed favor, he has failed to achieve the aim of a laudable ambition. Said Miller makes the following promises and pledges:

What He Promises
"1. That he will love his wife with a never-failing or waning love, and great her with kindness and consideration."
"2. That he will provide her with a good home, free from the cares of domestic duties, save and except cooking meals for two, mending, patching and housekeeping in general on a light scale, family washing excepted."
"3. That I will give her freely of all my income."
"4. That she may have her own way in all things so long as she consents to remain with me as my wife."
"5. That I will not speak cross to her and that if I do or say anything to anger her I will stand by quietly and let her administer such punishment as may satisfy her that I am truly penitent."

"Further," your petitioner says, "not and prays the court that he may go hence within a day with a wife, pay the costs of this proceeding and live happily ever afterward."

Loneliness, aggravated by a social system which requires young men and

young women to wait upon formal introductions, caused Miller to write his letter. "To Miller there is nothing of a lark in his odd quest of domestic happiness. He is large, and speaks in a deep voice. He has no immediate relatives."

"I have known many women in Kansas and in Kansas City," he said, "but the trouble has been that the ones I have known have not been the kind I would like to marry. It seems strange, too, in a town like Kansas City, where one meets attractive women in the streets every day, that I should have become acquainted with a seldom with that kind."

Miller would like the woman to marry to have a little money. He has enough saved up for the wedding. He says if his future wife has enough resources to finance the primary campaign, he will return to his home in Longton, Kan., and make the race for congress on the Democratic ticket in the Third District this fall.

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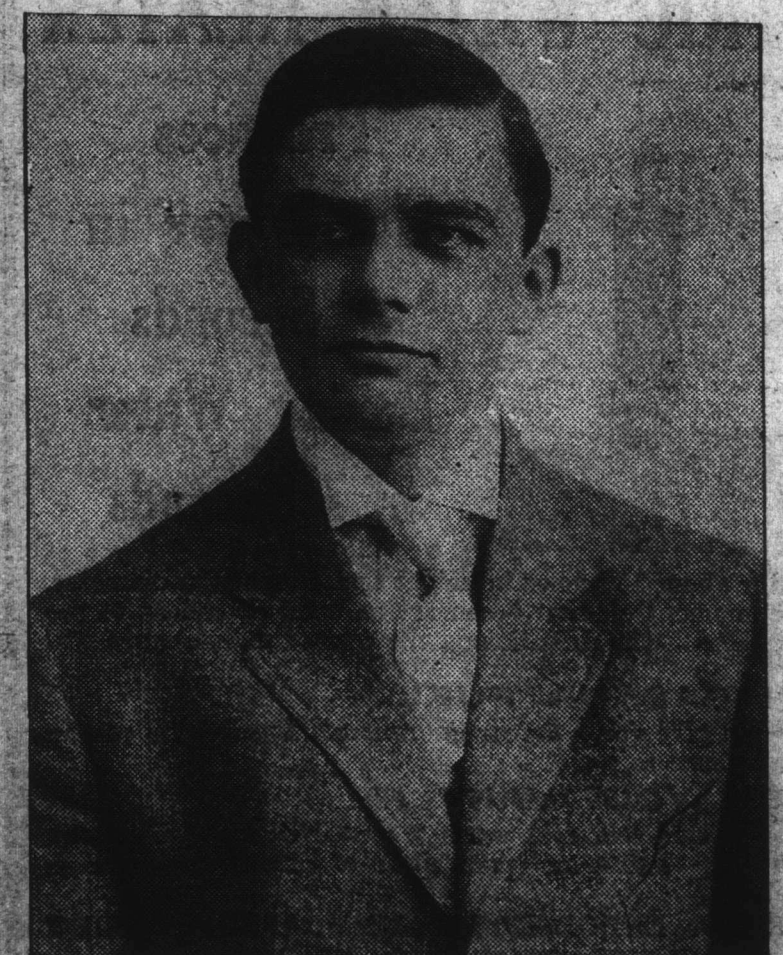
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
