Toronto, April 30—11 p.m.—Tonight there is an important high area to the north of the lake region and the St. Lawrence Valley, and the pressure is comparatively low over the Western States and the Northwest Territories. The weather has been showery in Manitoba and fine in other parts of the Dominion.

Minimum and maximum temperatures: Calgary, 24-68; Edmonton, 38-68; Prince Edward, 38-74; Qu'Appelle, 38-62; Pelly Sound, 48-64; Toronto, 45-65; Montreal, 50-58; Quebec, 42-58; Halifax, 36-64. Toronto, May 1—1 a.m.—The probabilities for the next 24 hours for the lower lake region (covering the peninsula and as far east as Belleville) are: Fresh to strong easterly winds; fair, and at most points cooler.

—Mr. S. H. Blake, the eminent Toronto lawyer, was in the city yesterday on legal business.

—The officers of the Young Liberal Fleet will meet this evening at the Simcoe Street Hotel for the purpose of organization.

—Mr. R. D. McDonald, of Line & McDonald, city, left yesterday on his annual trip to the Soo. He goes by the first boat of the season.

—St. George's Church, London West, will in future be lighted by incandescent lamps. The are light had been in use for a time, but the church wardens wanted to be up to the times.

—The general stock of F. G. Ball, of Cedar Springs, was sold yesterday afternoon to Gladhill & Co., of Goderich. The stock was valued at \$5,159.43, and brought 50 cents on the dollar. Mr. J. W. Jones conducted the sale.

—Bro. James Wilkins, of Court Pride of the Dominion, A. O. E., past high chief treasurer, and Bro. A. O. Jeffery, of Court Forest Queen, high sub-chief ranger, paid an official visit last evening to Court Elgin at St. Thomas.

—The new Catholic Church at Tilbury will be formally dedicated today. The ceremonies will be conducted by Bishop O'Connor, of London. The new edifice is one of the finest in the diocese, costing \$30,000.

—Although not announced at the time the liquor licenses were granted for the year, it appears that the city commissioners have placed the hour of closing at 11 o'clock, standard time, instead of 10 o'clock, solar time (or 10:27 standard time).

The London Hunt hounds will meet at the Kenilworth on Wednesday at 7 a.m. sharp. All welcome. First run of the season, under the new huntsman, Thos. Hyslop, for five years with the Montreal Hunt, and G. Montmorency, of Montreal, as whip.

—A Kingston, Ont., dispatch says: "Mr. Marsh, for the appellant, in the appeal case of Rev. G. W. Wye, before the Archbishop's court, has been holding the floor for the past four days, and the bishops have grown somewhat weary by the length at which the argument has been presented."

—At Osgoode Hall, in Scott vs. Hodgins, D. Armour, for plaintiff, appealed from order of junior local judge at London, allowing a jury notice filed and served by the defendant too late in an action upon a foreign judgment. W. N. Ferguson, for defendant, contra. Appeal dismissed. Costs in the cause.

—In the last number of the Ontario Gazette application for incorporation is made by a new company, to take over the printing, binding, stereotyping and electrotyping business carried on by Hunter, Rose & Co., of Toronto. The first directors of the new company are to be George MacLean Rose, Daniel Alexander Rose and Atwell Fleming (late of London).

—There was a lively runaway on Dundas street between 8 and 9 o'clock last night that afforded infinite excitement for a short time for the evening strollers on the thoroughfare. The horse was from Ardill's livery, and was driven by a soldier, who had a military companion in the rig. The animal started to run near Colborne street, and the soldiers either fell or clambered out. The horse continued down the crowded street, steering clear of other vehicles and numerous would-be stoppers until it smashed the rig against a telephone pole at the court house.

—The regular meeting of Court Forest Queen, A. O. E., held last evening in Albert Hall was largely attended and of unusual interest. A feature of the gathering was an official visit from the district chief ranger, Bro. F. Rossiter and a number of brethren from a distance. Five new members were also initiated and several candidates proposed. This court is in a prosperous condition, having 245 members on its roll, and accessions at almost every meeting. The court has of late been phenomenally free from sickness, only one brother having been on the sick list for several weeks past.

—The programme for the 24th of May in connection with the Boys' Brigade is progressing with great satisfaction to those engaged in arranging for that event. A most instructive and profitable lecture was delivered by Dr. Wishart in the First Congregational Church lecture hall last night to an appreciative and intelligent audience of the Boys' Brigade. The medals to be presented to the best drilled companies are exhibited in J. I. Anderson's store window. A church parade takes place next Sunday by companies commanded by Capt. Imrie and Cordingley. Capt. B. Cordingley served under the late Gen. Gordon in his last African expedition. The captain inspected the company of the Boys' Brigade in the Newsboys' Hall, and furthered the progress of arrangements for the Queen's Birthday demonstrations.

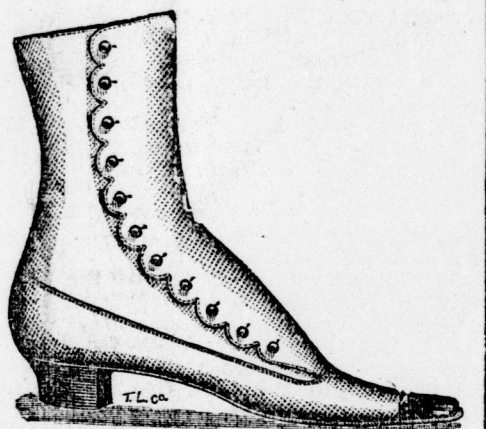

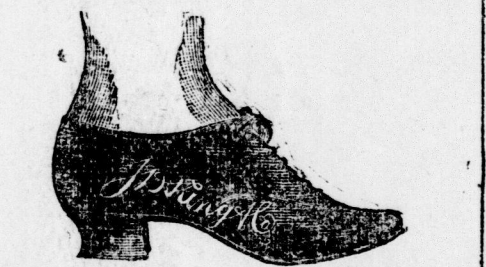
