THE TRUE SOURCE OF POWER.

Vitality and usefulness are imperilled when those who hold places of responsibility in the church go on in their work without the baptism of the Holy Ghost. The temptations not to depend upon the enabling power of the spirit is one which is strengthened by the fact that many duties, even in connection with the church, seem to require for their performance but ordinary human wisdom. We need, therefore, to be watchful, lest we lose the unfruitful habit of working only in our own strength. Words and acts not prompted by a heart filled with the Holy Spirit, usually work evil, instead of good. Our inner life determines the value of the service. "As the branch cannot bear fruit of itself, except it abide in the vine," no more can we, except we abide in Christ and his spirit abide in us. We are bidden, therefore, to seek the indwelling of the spirit, not in limited measure, but in its fullness, that our entire life may be spirit-directed. May he write it upon our hearts, as he has already written it in the divine Word, that we can render fruitful service in the work for the Master, only to the degree that we have received the spirit. Christian workers will find their efforts ineffective if the spirit of God does not work in them both to will and to do. It is said that Mr. Edison has in his laboratory a number of young men, who bow and says, "Good morning." Who takes out the device and tells the time of day. A marvelous mechanism! But it is not a man. The difference between it and a vigorous human being is no less great than the difference between a Christian without the spirit and one therewith endowed. The one is cold, mechanical; the other ardent, spontaneous. The one is in danger of being cast forth as a branch that is withered; the other bears much fruit. He is a true disciple.—New York Observer.

TURNING WARMER.

Toronto, Aug. 12—11 p.m.—The pressure is now highest over the lake region and Middle States. In the Dining-Room.

SATURDAY, AUG. 14.

BREAKFAST—Watermelon, Macaroni and ham, Bread and butter, Vinegar, Coffee.

LUNCHEON—Zrazl, a la hate, Fried potatoes, Fruit macedoine, Curly cakes, Tea.

DINNER—Russian chlodnik, Beef and tongue, Sauce lyonnaise, Vegetables au gratin, Cherry pie.

Cut out these recipes and paste them in a scrap-book.

Macaroni and Ham—Boll half a pound of macaroni in salted water until it is tender; strain and put in a bowl; then mix with one tablespoonful of butter, a quarter of a pound of ham, the latter cut in small pieces, two tablespoonfuls of thick sour cream and a handful of grated cheese. Mix together and then put in a greased pan and bake in hot oven over twenty minutes.

Vinegar—Boll three medium-sized potatoes; add to this one cucumber, remains of meat such as cold chicken, or fish, and if possible four mushrooms. Cut all this in small pieces. Then aside of this beat the yolks of three eggs, three tablespoonfuls of olive oil, adding a small quantity of it at a time, one tablespoonful of strong vinegar, some salt and white pepper, according to one's taste. (The above stirring to be done in a cool place and to consist of a uniform motion.) Line a salad bowl with crisp lettuce leaves, put in the ingredients mixed with the dressing, then garnish with a hard-boiled egg, sliced, and a few celery tips.

Zrazl a la Hate—Take half a pound of very tender beef, cut in inch wide pieces, beat well season with salt and pepper, add one grated onion, mix with a tablespoonful of flour. Have ready a pot with a tablespoonful of hot butter, then put in the meat and mix quickly and carefully until each piece loses its rawness. Then pour in half a cup of sweet cream, cover closely and boil for a while. Take care not to fry the meat too long.

Fruit macedoine—Every kind of fruit, such as raspberries, gooseberries, currants and musk melons, the latter cut in pieces, pour over with sugar, then put it into an ice box for two hours; when you will serve pour over with fruit juice.

Curly Cakes—Two tablespoonfuls of melted butter, one cup of water and a teaspoonful of sugar; boil this, and while boiling on a small fire and stirring constantly, pour in one cup of flour, stir until no more adheres to the pot. Then put in an egg, mix thoroughly, and when cool three eggs more. Mix well and over a large greased tin pan spread the dough, making it as thin as paper; cut this directly in square pieces, pour over sugar with finely chopped almonds and nutmeg and put into the ice box. Must be served very cold. This soup is excellent.

Russian Chlodnik—Boll pie plants in water without sugar, take one quart of this liquor without the pie plants. While yet hot put in some chopped dill, four dark red beets cooked and peeled, two sour cucumbers cut into squares, three hard-boiled eggs cut in slices, cooked crabs peeled from their shells. Then beat a pint of good thick sour cream, prepare with the obtained liquor and put into the ice box. Must be served very cold. This soup is excellent.

NOTHING TO EAT.

Seven Cases of Starvation in Five Days in Greater New York.

New York, Aug. 12.—Within the past five days one person has died of starvation in Greater New York. Another was taken to Bellevue Hospital and is at death's door. A family of four and a young man have since been found in desperate straits. Here is the list:

Nathan Rampel, wife and two children, found at their home, at No. 188 Ludlow street, too weak to move about for lack of food, on Aug. 5.

Mamie McCarthy, 17 years old, died of hunger at No. 502 Columbia street, Brooklyn, on Aug. 6.

John George Crook, 26 years old, without food for three days.

Frank Harper, 18 years old, found at Houston and Mercer streets. Had not touched food in five days. Taken to Bellevue.

In Greater New York every day enough food is wasted to supply an army of 25,000 men. In New York city nearly \$35,000,000 a year is spent in charity.

TIED EIGHT COUPLES FAST.

He Was a Justice of the Peace, and Didn't Marry Them for Fun.

Santa Fe, N. M., Aug. 13.—District Judge Hamilton, of the Eddy district, yesterday issued an order compelling from the records of Eddy county the marriage of two couples from the seven dividers precinct who had become victims of a mock marriage.

Testimony in the case of two other couples is being taken before District Attorney Franklin at Eddy, with a view to asking the judge to issue a similar order.

While the neighborhood was in attendance at a dance, eight young men, who were courting eight young women, decided to have a mock marriage. The girls were willing, and they called upon a patriarchal looking man in to perform the ceremony. Then the fact was learned that the man who performed the rites was a justice of the peace from an adjoining precinct.

The girls became alarmed. Their parents hurried them home, and the young men pleaded with the justice, declaring that it was only a joke, and urging him not to comply with the legal requirement by filing certificates of marriage.

The magistrate was firm. He said he must obey the law; so next day the certificates of marriage were duly filed in the county clerk's office.
