Postoffice Robbery.
On the night of Feb. 5, the postoffice at
Mount Brydges was entered by some un-
known persons and \$58 86 in cash, \$59 10 in
stamps and a letter containing \$4, and
another containing \$5 50 were stolen. The
manner in which an entrance was effected
is unknown, as, when the postmaster
opened the place in the morning the
door was locked and the windows
securely barred. It was not until
the proprietor was not in the habit of
locking, that the loss was discovered.
Entrance, however, is supposed to have
been effected by means of a key, and the
case was reported to the Government. A
detective was sent to investigate, and, in
company with Detective Rider, of this
city, arrested Benjamin Fisher, a resident
of the village this morning. Fisher was
brought to the city and landed in jail.
The following dispatch from Mount
Brydges refers to the arrest:
"Ben Fisher, a well respected resident of
the village, was arrested and taken to
London by two detectives to appear before
the magistrate on the charge of robbing the
postoffice here a couple of weeks ago.
Fisher was one of the parties that found the
till and some letters in the Baptist Church
shed. Bail was offered here but was re-
fused. It is the general opinion that
Fisher is innocent."

QUEER THOMAS QUEER.

**Disappeared for Years and Now His
Family Will Not Recognize Him.**
TOLEDO, Ohio, Feb. 16.—Thomas Queer,
who is now 85 years old, has had a
romantic experience. Forty-five years ago
he left his wife and two small children,
both girls, for parts unknown. Nothing
was heard of him. His wife applied for
and was granted a divorce.

**Irish People on an Island Suffer for
Lack of Food.**

DUBLIN, Feb. 16.—Advices received here
from the north of Ireland announce that
a lifeboat, after a perilous voyage, has suc-
ceeded in reaching the island of Inishtrahull,
nine miles to the north of Malin Head,
at the extreme north of Ireland,
whose 50 inhabitants have been unable for
weeks past to communicate with the main-
land, and who were believed to have been
in danger of dying from starvation. The
lifeboat on its way to Inishtrahull was
buffeted by enormous seas, which filled
the cabin, and necessitated lashing the
cargoes to the people. The lifeboat's
crew found the people of Inishtrahull in
sore straits; they had been compelled to use
the furniture and woodwork of their houses
for fuel. So far as provisions were con-
cerned, there was only a handful of potatoes
left on the island. Happily, the in-
habits, with one exception, had man-
aged to sustain life until the arrival of the
lifeboat, which brought a small supply of
food for the suffering people. As it was,
one man died of starvation, and a number
of others were found to be suffering severely
from lack of food. The crew of the lifeboat
did their utmost to relieve the sufferings of
the unfortunate inhabitants of Inishtrahull,
left all the provisions they had with them
succeeded in returning safe to the main-
land. An additional supply of food will be
sent to Inishtrahull immediately.

Mark Irish Dead.

TORONTO, Ont., Feb. 16.—Mark H. Irish,
formerly manager of the Rossin House, and
one of the most prominent residents in
Toronto, died this morning. He had been
suffering from general broking and commercial
agency work for the past seven years. He
was somewhat over 60 years of age.
