BOUND TO GET THERE.

"Paul Jones," the Globe Trotter-His Identity Revealed.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Feb. 16. - "Paul Jones," who started naked and penniless from Boston to go around the world and bring back \$5,000, turned up at the Park Hotel, Attleboro, Mas .. Vesterday a reception charging the privilege of shaking hands. He sold his autograph to a great many people. He wore the \$5 aut of clothes in which he left Boston. Yesterday afternoon he challenged Lewis Morse to a foot race for \$1 a side. They ran 100 yards in the snow and the traveler won by five feet. BOSTON, Mass., Feb. 16.-Now that "Paul Jones" is on the way to New York, the first lap in his journey around the world, people are beginning to guess at his identity. The most common guess is that it is E. C. Pieffer, well known here. A few of his occupations are: Athlete, inventor, poet, teacher, hotel-keeper, newspaper writer, critic, professional traveler, amateur prestidigitator. He was a special student at Harvard in 1887, and was chosen captain of the crew. He gave up

the captaincy in February before the race. He invented an attachment to a fountain pen and spent a long time to perfect it, but finally gave it up. He issued a volume of poems while at Harvard dedicated to his friends, many of whom, beginning with President Elliott, he mentions by name. Pfeffer shows his athletic training. ON THE VERGE OF STARVATION.

Irish People on an Island Suffer for Lack of Food.

Dublin, Feb. 16.—Advices received here from the north of Ireland announce that a lifeboat, after a perilous voyage, has succeeded in reaching the island of Innistrahull, nine miles to the north of Malin Head, at the extreme north of Ireland, whose 50 inhabitants have been unable for weeks past to communicate with the main land, and who were believed to have been in danger of dying from starvation. The lifeboat on its way to Innistrabull was buffeted by enormous seas, which filled the boat and necessitated lashing the oarsmen to their seats. The lifeboat's crew found the people of Innistrahull in sore straits; they had been compelled to use the furniture and woodwork of their houses cerned, there was only a handful of potatoes left on the island. Happily, the inhabitants, with one exception, had managed to sustain life until the arrival of the lifeboat, which brought a small supply of food for the suffering people. As it was, one man died of starvation, and a number of others were found to be suffering severely from lack of food. The crew of the lifeboat did their utmost to relieve the sufferings of the unfortunate inhabitants of Innistrahull, left all the provisions they had with them and succeeded in returning safe to the mainland. An additional supply of food will be sent to Innistrahull immediately.

Mark Irish Dead. TORONTO, Ont., Feb. 16. - Mark H. Irish, formerly manager of the Rossin House, and one of the most prominent residents in Toronto, died this morning. He had been doing general broking and commercial agency work for the past seven years. He was somewhat over 60 years of age.
