Milk and Water.

Deliberations of the Board of
Health.

Suggestions Affecting the City's
Sanitary State.

The Quality of Milk Supplied to the
Public—Delinquent Vendors to
be Prosecuted.

At the meeting of the Board of Health
last evening, the present were: Ald.
Heaman, acting as chairman; James Bell,
secretary; Ald. Searrow, Stevely, Moule,
Parnell, Mayor Essery, ex-Ald Skinner, Dr.
Hutchinson and Mr. Bell.

Dr. Hutchinson presented a report in
regard to the quality of the milk sup-
plied to the city, and between York
and King streets. A portion of this pas-
sageway is cobbled, over which earth
and refuse have accumulated to the extent
of several inches. The medical health
officer wants this removed, and the re-
sidents to take such action.

A communication was read from Mr. A.
D. Rodgers objecting to the condition of a
tank in the cellar of Alfred Stewart's
premises. Prior to this the same gen-
tleman had written a similar letter. Dr.
Hutchinson has made an investigation and
finds the condition of affairs not so serious
as represented. Mr. Stewart, however,
has consented to attend to some minor
details.

Dr. Hutchinson presented his semi-
annual report upon the quality of milk
supplied to the city, with the condition of
the herds and dairies. The majority of the
dealers were found to be above the regu-
lations regarding their supplies. There were
ten delinquents, whose milk was largely
watered. These will be prosecuted by the
board.

Mr. Frank Spettigue, of Westminster,
had heard that Dr. Hutchinson had made
a statement to a lady customer that his
stables were unclean. He would like to
hear what the report had to say in this
connection. Dr. Hutchinson read "Herd
in good condition and clean," Mr. Spet-
tigue seemed satisfied.

The mayor said that he could speak of
this gentleman's milk from experience.
He had been raised on a farm, where he
had to milk cows, and he knew a good
quality of this liquid when he drank it.

An informal discussion on the best
method of draining concluded proceedings.
