

HOW COLLEGIATE PUPILS STAND ON THE WORK OF THE FALL TERM

Results Announced—Remarkably High Standing Taken by Some of the Pupils.

The results of the work of the fall term in the Collegiate Institute have been given out. Each student is classified according to his standing in the examination and in the class work of the past four months. In Class I, are those who obtained over 70 per cent; Class II, over 60 per cent; Class III, over 50 per cent; Class IV, over 40 per cent; Class V, over 30 per cent; Class VI, under 30 per cent. The classes, of course, represents very bad work, but luckily no pupils are to be found therein this time.

The principal of the school has sent a detailed report of each student's work to the parents, and the latter are requested to sign the same and return it as soon as possible.

Much credit is due to Clair Adams, winner of the Robb medal at the entrance examinations, who obtained 100 per cent. Other high marks were obtained by the following: Christine Merchant, 99 per cent, who was only 10 marks behind Clair Adams for the Robb medal. Althouse, 97 1/2 per cent; Hazel Brownlee, 95 1/2 per cent. It must be mentioned that either Latin or French were given as a bonus to the above marks, nevertheless, are remarkably good. In the middle school, special mention must be given to Laura Fitzgerald and Lily Bell.

policy, and then vote for it. Even if our talk amounted to anything, we might do so, but judging from the great Liberal cause, we might talk till doomsday, and not accomplish anything. The temperance people talked before the committee on resolutions in the convention, some of the clergymen taking off their coats and others pledging themselves to abstain from the use of alcohol.

The only honorable course left for temperance Liberals is to speak with their votes, and speak in such a way that they shall be heard. To stay in the party and vote for it would only be to strengthen the very power they are opposing.

I have voted and worked for Mr. Ross and the Liberal party with all my might in the vain hope that he would cut loose from the whisky element; but in the last convention I lost confidence in him as a temperance leader, and in the Liberal party as a temperance party. The course of the convention was a disgraceful one, and I am ashamed to say that I have voted for it.
