

TYPHOON FIGHTS FOR JAPS;
RUSSIAN SHIPS SCATTERED

Great Storm Off South Coast of China Does Heavy Damage to Rojestvensky's Vessels—Transports With Nebogatoff's Division Collide—Russia Buys New Navies.

AMERICA, CHINA, MAY 4. — A TYPHOON, WHICH SWEEP OVER THE COAST OF SOUTHERN CHINA THIS WEEK IS SAID TO HAVE DAMAGED THE RUSSIAN SECOND PACIFIC SQUADRON CONSIDERABLY. THE LIGHTER VESSELS ARE REPORTED TO HAVE BEEN SCATTERED.

SHIPPING MEN EXPECT FURTHER DELAY IN THE EXECUTION OF ROJESTVENSKY'S PLANS, AS A RESULT OF THE DAMAGE SUSTAINED BY THE SQUADRON.

London, Thursday, May 4. — The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Times says that rumors have been current for several days that Messrs. Schwab and Flint effected the sale of the Argentine and Chilean navies to the Russians. The ministry of marine denies the rumors, but they are gathering force. It is declared that several transports are leaving Cronstadt with sailors to man the purchases.

Nebogatoff at Malacca.

Singapore, May 4. — The British steamer Zenger, which arrived here today, reports having passed a division of Russian warships off Buegh, midway between the Island of Penang and Singapore, at 9 o'clock this morning.

Island of Penang, Straits of Malacca, May 4. — The Russian warships sighted by the British steamer Zenger this morning have been identified as the fourth division, commanded by Rear-Admiral Nebogatoff, of the Russian second Pacific squadron.

Transports Collide.

London, May 4. — A cable dispatch received in London this afternoon says that two of Nebogatoff's transports have collided in the Gulf of Aden, off the coast of the Island of Sumatra, with their bows stove in, evidently having been run into by the Russian ship given as the Marie Chen and the Perme Hesseusmuller.

EDWARD LEAVES FRANCE

His Majesty Goes Home Greatly Pleased With His Trip.

Paris, May 4. — King Edward left Paris at noon today for London. He was accompanied to the depot by representatives of President Loubet and Foreign Minister Delcasse, and many officials. His majesty bestowed a number of decorations of the Order of Victoria and expressed the great satisfaction which he had experienced from his sojourn in France.

DUNRAVEN ON IRELAND

Only Cure for Hibernia's Troubles Is Through Self-Government.

London, Thursday, May 4. — The morning papers give prominence to a pamphlet by Lord Dunraven, entitled "The Crisis in Ireland," in which he formulates the policy of the Irish Reform Association, of which he is president. He draws a gloomy picture of the conditions in Ireland, although he admits that Mr. Wyndham's land act has done much to improve them. He contends that the Irish must be shaken out of their apathy and lifted out of their despair, and that the real motive power to accomplish this can only be found in self-government. He says that the largest possible freedom of action and self-governing power consistent with the supremacy of the Imperial Parliament be delegated to Ireland. He condemns what is known as the Castle Government as a very bad sort of bureaucracy and as extravagantly expensive, costing twice as much as it would in any other country. Lord Dunraven contends that from two to three million pounds a year could be saved by establishing a rational system.

BORDEN'S AMENDMENT LOST;
GOVERNMENT MAJORITY 81

Thirteen Conservatives Help to Bury Their Leader's Amendment to School Clause of Autonomy Bill—Powerful Closing Address by Minister of Justice.

Ottawa, May 3. — The division which tonight brought to a conclusion the protracted debate upon the second reading of the Government measure to establish the Province of Alberta gave a majority of 81 for the bill, the largest given in the history of Parliament for an important Government measure where party lines were drawn. The debate was a memorable one, and the interest taken in it was evidenced by the crowded state of the galleries all day. An air of suppressed excitement pervaded the chamber from the opening of the House, and the enthusiasm of the opposing parties was wrought up to a high pitch by the closing speeches. The Minister of Justice, who made the final presentation of the legal and constitutional aspects of the case from the treasury benches in a brilliant speech of nearly three hours' duration, was accorded an ovation and received the personal congratulations of the Premier.

Vote Was Unexpected.

The call for the vote when it came was unexpected, and some delay was necessary in order to give the whips opportunity to scour the corridors and lobbies for members who had not expected the division for another hour or more. It was generally understood that Mr. W. F. Maclean intended speaking, but he had not time to catch the Speaker's eye, and the question was put. The moment the division bell started members commenced to pour in. The galleries were speedily crowded to excess. Lady Laurier, who seldom misses a division, occupied her accustomed seat, and was accompanied by a large party.

The vote was taken at 12:15 a.m., and amid enthusiastic demonstrations Mr. Speaker declared the yeas 89 and the nays 140, a majority of 81 for the Government. The vote was upon the amendment by Mr. Borden, and when the deputy clerk swept his eyes over the Government benches first, as the custom is, one solitary figure met his view, that of Mr. Leighton McCarthy, member for North Simcoe, who has since he succeeded his late uncle, Mr. D'Alton McCarthy, been recognized as an independent member, although occupying a seat on the Government side. WARSAW COMES
TO A STANDSTILL

Workmen Halt All Business and Street Traffic in the Polish City.

Warsaw, May 4, 4:05 p.m. — All business and street traffic practically ceased at noon. Some of the houses are barricaded. A few merchants who tried to keep open were visited by pickets of workmen who ordered them to shut their places of business immediately. Nearly all the street cars have stopped running and the cab service is entirely suspended. Many cabs earlier in the day were stopped by parties of youths who compelled their occupants to alight, in some instances forcibly throwing them out of the vehicles, and then ordering their drivers to go home. Immense crowds have gone to Grzybnia Cemetery, where the victims of Monday's shooting are buried.

ALL ON BOARD LOST

Barge Goes Down With Five Souls Off Rhode Island Coast.

Newport, R. I., May 4. — The New London tug Gertrude put into Newport harbor today and reported the loss of the barge Moonbeam off Point Judith last night, with all on board, including the captain, engineer, steward, and two children of the captain. The captain of the tugboat did not know the names of any of those drowned.

SAN JOSE SCALE
IN KENT COUNTY

And Nothing Is Being Done by the Farmers to Check It.

Toronto, May 4. — San Jose Scale Inspector Smith has made a careful inspection of the orchards in the vicinity of Belleville, and found no trace of scale in that district.

The report of the inspection made in the townships of streets and part of Kent County shows the scale is very extensive, and is now over a large area south of Chatham to the lake. The farmers of that section are turning their attention from fruit growing to other crops, and consequently are doing little or nothing to check the scale, whereas in the Niagara district the fruit-growers seem to have become thoroughly aroused to the necessity of spraying, and are now working vigorously to save their orchards.

TENDERS FOR NEW LINE

Government Seeking a Fortnightly Service, St. John to London.

Ottawa, May 4. — Tenders have been called, due June 15, for steamship service, including the carrying of the mails, for one year, from July 1, 1905, between St. John, N. B., and London, calling on all voyages at Halifax. Steamers will sail from terminal ports at intervals of 15 days or during the fruit-shipment season, at intervals of 10 days, when so required by the minister, the eastbound voyage speed not to be less than 12 knots. The steamers must be fitted up with accommodation for carrying perishable cargoes with cool temperature, refrigerating apparatus and a space of 2,500 feet.

INCORPORATION OF Y. M. C. A.

Bill of the London Association Reported by Committee.

Toronto, May 4. — The private bills committee reported favorably on the bill for the incorporation of the Young Men's Christian Association of London. The object of the corporation is the spiritual, intellectual, social and physical development of young men. Its building and site are to be exempt from taxation.

WESTERN CENTRAL RAILWAY

Proposed Line From London to Guelph Before Committee.

Toronto, May 3. — Mr. A. T. Drummond addressed the railway committee today in favor of the incorporation of the Western Central Railway Company. The proposed route is from London to Guelph, through the Zorra and Nissouris, and equidistant between the C. P. R. and the Grand Trunk. Two branches are asked for, one to Stratford and the other to Woodstock, making with the main line about 85 miles of track. No opposition was offered, and the bill was reported.

BULLETS FOR SINGERS

Cossacks Fire Upon Poles Who Were Singing Patriotic Hymns.

Lodz, Russian Poland, May 4. — Seven persons were fatally wounded by a Cossack patrol yesterday evening, who fired into the midst of a crowd engaged in singing patriotic songs in front of the Church of the Cross. A number of bullets entered the church doors and struck the altar, causing an excitement among the congregation. After the crowd had been dispersed workmen captured a detective and beat him nearly to death before he was rescued. Further disturbances are anticipated today.

A Gunning Fatality.

Tara, Ont., May 4. — John Currie, of the township of Elderslie, while out hunting, was accidentally shot this morning. He was climbing over a fence when the gun was prematurely discharged, the contents lodging in his breast. He died within a few minutes. He leaves a widow and family.

NAN PATTERSON
JURY DISAGREED

No Result After Twelve Hours' Deliberation.

LIKELY TO BE DISCHARGED

Dramatic Scenes Around the Tomb, Prison—Beautiful Actress in Collapse—To Be Bailed.

New York, May 4. — The Nan Patterson jury disagreed at midnight. Dramatic in the extreme, were the closing scenes, early today, of the Nan Patterson trial before Recorder Goff on the charge of having murdered Frank J. Young, the well-known turfman and bookmaker, in a cab last June.

When the foreman had finally assured the court that there was no possibility of reaching an agreement, the prisoner was in a dead faint. At 2:28 o'clock, the recorder declared that the jury be discharged, and ordered Miss Patterson returned to the Tombs Prison. She was carried out in a chair by attendants, and two doctors had a hard time restoring consciousness. When told of the result she smiled faintly. In the streets below thousands of persons, held back by mounted policemen, cheered and cursed as they passed. They evidently favored the young woman, and had expected her acquittal.

Various rumors gained currency as to how the jury stood. Information received by the Associated Press, is that the poll was 7 to 5 in favor of acquittal.

IT IS QUITE CERTAIN THAT THE FORMER SHOW GIRL WILL BE GIVEN HER LIBERTY ON NOMINAL BAIL, AND THAT THE INDICTMENT WILL BE QUASHED. SHE HAS FACED TRIAL THREE TIMES—TWICE THE JURY DISAGREED, AND ONCE THERE WAS A MISTRIAL OWING TO THE COLLAPSE OF A JUROR.

In the court annals of this city nothing has yet approached the drama of the Nan Patterson case. When Recorder Goff was summoned to court, soon after 1 o'clock the room was filled with spectators, and a large number of women. Only those possessing permits were allowed to enter, but in the streets surrounding the Tombs and the courthouses were thousands awaiting the outcome.

Although in a state bordering on collapse, the defendant went to her cell early today after the jury had been discharged. Miss Patterson soon quieted, and slept peacefully through the night. Her deputy warden making his rounds at 8 o'clock found Miss Patterson and her sister Julia in the cell, and carried them to the Tombs, and left them at the door without disturbing either of the women. About that time crowds of people gathered in front of the Tombs awaiting possible developments, which might make it necessary to release the prisoner.

Mr. Levy, counsel for Miss Patterson, said that he would apply for a writ of habeas corpus, as far as her liberty is concerned. It may be that the district attorney will apply to have her admitted to bail. If he does not, then I shall take the steps. She never will be placed on trial again. Of this I am quite sure, and am appointed that she was not acquitted."

It was said at the district attorney's office today that the prosecution would not oppose the release of Nan Patterson on bail, provided the sum were fixed at from \$10,000 to \$20,000. It is expected that Recorder Goff will in his office today, and it is possible that Miss Patterson may be released before night.

HERE TO WINDSOR

London, Chatham and Western Capitalized at \$2,000,000—Route To Be Followed.

Toronto, May 4. — Mr. Bowyer's bill to incorporate the London, Chatham and Western Railway provides for the construction of an electric line from London to Windsor, passing through London, Lobo, Carleton Place, Elfrida, Glenora, Mosa, Bothwell, Thamesville, Chatham, Raleigh, Tilbury, East Tilbury village, Tilbury North, Rochester, Maldstone and Sandwich. The capital stock is \$2,000,000, and the head office is at Chatham. The provisional directors are James Nelson Lewis and M. M. Tremblay, of Detroit, and Wm. P. Young, of the well-known turfman and bookmaker, in a cab last June.

RODNEY PRISONERS
MORE UNCONCERNED

Mrs. Covell Unable to Walk From Train at Preliminary Examination.

A special to The Advertiser from Rodney says:

The preliminary investigation into the charges against Mrs. Benjamin Covell and Alexander Willis, of having, on Tuesday, April 18, or Wednesday, April 19, murdered Miss Elizabeth Lowrey, was opened in McCollum Hall at 10 a.m., before County Police Magistrate Hunt, Mr. McCrimmon, county attorney for Elgin, prosecuting.

J. C. Elliott, of Glenora, appeared for Mrs. Covell, and C. S. Leitch, of Leitch, of Dutton, for Willis. The prisoners were brought up on the M. C. R. early this morning, and were assisted by an officer and her husband to and from the train. Both she and Willis seemed quite unconcerned, but listened to the evidence intently.

Only two witnesses were examined this morning. The first was Dr. Patterson, of Rodney, who repeated his former evidence, describing the injuries to the dead woman. When he was called on the morning of Wednesday, April 19, the body was still lying in the rear of the house. The clothing and three pairs of shoes were found on the lower part of the body. Death was caused from a blow on the side of the head. Deceased could not have walked from the house to where she was found if the blow had been struck in the house. The doctor also examined Mrs. Covell, who complained of injuries to her foot, knee, limbs and head, but only on the face and head, and also bruises and blood on the lower part of the body.
