BEST SECURITY AND CHEAPNESS

Principal Features of Hon. Mr. Fielding's Proposed Plan of Annuities.

Ottawa, March 10 .- In the House of Commons this afternoon, Hon. W. S. Fielding, minister of finance, brought down his resolution providing for Govern-

ment annuities. The chief features of the resolution are: An annuity shall not be less than \$50 nor more than \$600 per year, purchasable either by paying a single sum or by the payment of a stipulated sum periodically at fixed and definite intervals. Such annuities to be payable after the annuitant

has reached the age of 55 years, or has become disabled. The money paid in by the annuitant to be repayable, should the annultant die before annuity is payable, to the heirs of

the annuitant, with 3 per cent interest. ompounded yearly. Principal and interest of the annuitan! n the contract to be unassignable, and to be exempt from legal process except a contract be entered into and consideration therefor paid with the intent to delay or hinder or defraud creditors, and upon establishing such intent in a court of competent jurisdiction, the creditors to have the right to receive, if annuity has not become payable, the amount paid in, with 3 per cent simple interest, or if annuity has become payable, the present worth of the same.
