In making the announcement, President

ohnson made the provision that these games would take place in the event that the Cubs fail to win the National pennant.

Johnson said it was evident that Pitts arg did not want to meet either the hiladelphia or Boston teams, and that there was no prospect of a meeting be tween the Cincinnati and Cleveland teams for the Ohio championship.
