Association Stars, Candidates for Major Leagues

A Wonderful Southpaw, a Great Infielder and the "Fastest Man in Baseball"

It won't be long before the major league clubs begin buying phenoms found in every bush and fast minor leaguers in the country.

In the American Association a half-dozen fast youngsters are picked by the dopsters to get trials in the big leagues.

In Kansas City, Charles Carr believes he has one of the best, in Third Baseman Johnny Corriden, who kicked himself out of the American Association a couple of years ago by letting Napoleon Lajoie beat out something like seven or eight bunts one afternoon when Larry and Cobb were fighting for batting honors.

Corriden has lost his timidity. He is strong on hard hit balls or bunts. He is one of the greatest ground-covering infielders in the American Association, and goes after everything.

Given a job until another player's finger recovered usefulness, and becoming the most-talked-about player in the league, is the fate of Kempfer Shelton, Columbus fielder, declared the fastest man in baseball.
