At the conclusion of Rev. Mr. Hazen's afternoon address, a brass band in memory of Richard H. Steadman, erected by his mother, was unveiled by Robert Tuft, associate superintendent of the Sabbath school. The Collegiate Orchestra, under the direction of Melville Platt, provided the music for the afternoon.

Membership of 450.
The Centennial Sunday School is one of the most flourishing in the city. It has a membership of over four hundred and fifty, and is still growing phenomenally. 75 members being added since March 8, 1914. It has a staff of 26 efficient teachers. The primary classroom of the new building is found to be too small already, and not nearly large enough to accommodate its 70 little members.

The library has just been reorganized, 208 new volumes being added to the already large list.

The school has raised \$756 this last year, and has given \$200 to the church trustees for the building fund. Yesterday the scholars raised over one hundred and fifty dollars for Sunday school purposes.

ST. PAUL'S UNITED EVANGELICAL CHURCH.

St. Paul's United Evangelical Church, Grey and Wellington streets, was founded Sunday evening, July 9, 1905, by Rev. W. A. Biermann, of Buffalo, a member of the home mission board of the New York district of the Evangelical Synod of North America. At a meeting held in the Duffield hall, Clarence and Dundas streets, from July 16, 1905, to September of the same year, meetings were held in the Evangelical Synod, earlier churches in the Duffield hall, where it met until the erection of the present church building in 1906. The Evangelical Synod of North America, although independent in itself, corresponds to and is identical in all important respects with the "Evangelische Kirche" or Prussian State Church, of which Kaiser Wilhelm II. is a member. It is a union of the Lutheran and Reformed churches of Germany, a union which many synods in America refuse to recognize. The local church was originally established to meet the religious needs of the German residents of London, but now only one service, the Sunday morning one, is held in the German tongue. It was one of the first churches established in Canada by the Evangelical Synod, and is now being founded, however, in Quebec and in Neustadt, Ontario.

The members of the first "Kirchenrat" or board of trustees and church council, were H. Wagner, H. Hundertmark, F. Kaiser, and L. Refor. At the date of dedication of the present church building, August 26, 1906, the trustees were H. Wagner, chairman; Emil Elehmann, recording secretary; A. Rumpf, financial secretary; F. Kaiser, secretary; L. Refor, and F. Menz.

Remained Only Short Time.
Rev. Mr. Elehmann remained as pastor for only a short time, and he was succeeded by Rev. J. C. Twele, Rev. H. V. Schwabe, Rev. Reinhardt Wobus, and the present pastor, Rev. Henry Noehren, who came from Buffalo, in July 1911 to succeed Rev. Mr. Wobus. The present board of trustees includes Peter Hoffmann, president;

Austin Brill, vice-president; Alfred Hertel, secretary; F. Kaiser, treasurer; John Davidson and L. Refor.

The officers of the Ladies' Aid Society are: Mrs. (Rev.) H. Noehren, president; Mrs. Day, vice-president; Mrs. Alma Armitage, secretary, and Mrs. Wachmuth, treasurer. On Thursday evening of this week, this successful church auxiliary society has arranged an elaborate concert program which will include, besides numbers by local talent of St. Paul's Church, solos by Miss Gwendolyn Ware, contralto-soloist of Dundas Centre Methodist Church; readings by Miss Marjorie Milne, elocutionist, and instrumentalists by other well-known artists. Dramatic recitations of the "Ladies' Aid and Christian Endeavor Societies" will be displayed in the playlets, "For Love of a Bonnet," "A Sewing Circle," and "Der Direktor Schmidt," the latter in German.

At the head of the Christian Endeavor Society is Miss Alma Kaiser, president; Miss Mae Weber, secretary; and Mrs. Alfred Hertel, treasurer. The society has a missionary committee in connection, composed of Rev. H. Noehren, Mrs. Davidson, Miss Georgine Hoffmann, and Miss Gunther.

Sunday School Officers.
Officers of the Sunday school are: Rev. Mr. Noehren, superintendent; Carl Rindellhardt, assistant superintendent; Mrs. (Rev.) H. Noehren, treasurer; Mrs. (Rev.) H. Noehren, Miss Meta Kaiser, Miss Alma Kaiser, Miss Pope, Miss Annie Gunther, and Mrs. Hundertmark, teachers.

All departments of the church work are in a flourishing condition, the membership is increasing steadily, and the financial condition of the church is very encouraging.

Yesterday morning Rev. Mr. Noehren preached in German on "The Vision of God's Greatness, and the Visions of Sin, of Salvation, and of Service from the text, Isaiah VI, 1-8. His evening service in English was from the text, Acts XX, 35. "It is more blessed to give than to receive."

Desired Amount Almost Reached at One Service—Work to Start in Summer.
Nearly the entire cost of a new \$3,000 parsonage was subscribed by members of Dundas Centre Methodist Church at the two services yesterday, and the work will be commenced early this summer, the new parsonage to be erected just east of the church on the site of the present parsonage, which will be torn down.

PLEDGE \$6,800 IN MORNING A PATHETIC INCIDENT

Rev. W. R. McIntosh Preaches After Hearing of His Own Mother's Death.

Mother's Day was observed in London yesterday by the wearing of white flowers, special services and special sermons in the churches, as tributes to the nation's mothers. In nearly every church in London special services were held in the morning in observance of the day set apart over all the civilized world as a day sacred to mothers.

Unusually Sad Significance.
Mother's Day services in King Street Presbyterian Church had an unusually sad significance for the pastor, Rev. W. R. McIntosh, who on Saturday received word of the death of his mother, Mrs. Robert McIntosh, of Lucknow, while visiting her daughter, Mrs. A. Goodhand, of Wetaskiwin, Alta. Her daughter, Miss Cassie McIntosh, was with her on her visit to Alberta. News of her death came as a great shock to Rev. Mr. McIntosh. Only a few days ago, he received a letter from her in which she declared that she was enjoying the best of health. She was 75 years of age. The telegram received on Saturday gave no particulars of her death.

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Leaves For Listowel.
Rev. Mr. McIntosh's father died seven years ago. His mother is survived by one other son, August McIntosh, of Lucknow, and four daughters, Mrs. Robert Thompson, of Seattle, Wash.; Mrs. Goodhand, of Wetaskiwin; Mrs. Isaac Hetherington, of Goderich, and Miss Cassie McIntosh, of Lucknow. The funeral will be held on Tuesday afternoon at Lucknow. Rev. Mr. McIntosh left this morning, and will meet the remains, which will be accompanied by his sisters from the west, at Listowel. All the members of the family, it is expected, will be present at the funeral.

Lives Part of Eternal Process.
"You live and mine," said Rev. Mr. Johnston, "are part of an eternal process viewed from the beginning of eternity in the thought of God. No matter what view of the atonement you take, even if you take the rather loose view of the general atonement of Jesus, in His great example to us of the all-consuming sacrificial life on the altars of God, yet in the life and influence of Jesus Christ is laid up for us an eternal store of goodness and love. God has hid away great and many blessings, until man demands them. Many lives are impoverished because they are not ready to ask God for these blessings. Ask and ye shall receive. I have many things to say unto you, but ye cannot bear them now," said Jesus. How sinful, how foolish, then to rest our creeds and faith on the opinions of past ages and historic councils.

The Roman Catholics rest their faith on the declarations of the councils. So do the Anglicans largely base their faith on historic standards. Many Presbyterians think that the Westminster confession contains all the truth, and there are Methodists who think that it lived and died with John Wesley. But new truths will be given to our children, and our children's children, from generation to generation."

A feature of the special music rendered by the choir, under the direction of Parrell Morris, organist and choirmaster, was a tenor solo, "The Ninety and Nine," sung by Herbert Hodgson. Next Sunday morning, Mr. Hodgson will sing for the last time in Dundas Centre Church before returning to England to take up contract work with his father.

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ple, he told of Ruskin, Salisbury, Gladstone, and Lincoln, who said: "All that I am or hope to be, I owe to my angel mother."

"A Mother's Secret" was the subject of a fitting sermon by Rev. H. H. Bingham in the Talbot Street Baptist Church in the morning. Almost every person present wore a white flower.

The death of an aged woman, who had endeared herself to an entire community, is now attributed as the direct cause of the movement that started in Philadelphia a few short years ago, and has now culminated in the universal observance of a Mother's Day. The woman who originated the Mothers' Day idea was Miss Anna Jarvis, daughter of a Philadelphia clergyman. The death of the old lady so generally beloved set Mrs. Jarvis to thinking. There ought to be some way, she reasoned, to make the cold world pause in its fight after dollars and fashions, and commemorate the lives of women, who, as mothers, lived a sweet, pure existence, bearing unflinchingly the burden of family morality, and public uplift.

London Was First.
Failing to have Congress pass a resolution making Mothers' Day a national holiday, Miss Jarvis wrote to hundreds of Y. M. C. A. secretaries, mayors of cities, and heads of fraternal societies. Frank W. Bunn, mayor of Lincoln, Nebraska, was the first to issue a proclamation in 1908, proclaiming the second Sunday in May Mothers' Day. Great publicity was given the idea, and now observance of the day is worldwide. London was the first city in the Dominion to observe Mothers' Day in 1911.

The white carnation worn on this day is an emblem of a true mother's virtues, "its whiteness for purity; its form for beauty; its fragrance for love; its wide field of growth for charity, and its lasting quality for faithfulness."

Attention of Miss Jarvis that the custom of paying tribute to mothers would bring more devotion and appreciation to the living mothers, and more tender and halting memories for the departed.
