

GLADSTONE RAY GOES TO TRIAL

Committed on Charge of Having Caused Death of John Barr.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

GUELPH, July 16.—Gladstone Ray, charged with the murder of John Barr, was committed for trial today by Magistrate Watt, after the crown had put in all the evidence thought advisable and after Col. Macdonald, crown attorney, who is prosecuting, and the prisoner's counsel, Mr. C. L. Dunbar, had addressed the bench at some length.

Magistrate Watt, in summing up the evidence, concluded that there was sufficient evidence to send the accused before a judge and jury. The fact that the crown had discovered that Ray had spent the most of the day and night preceding the murder with Barr, and was the last man known to be in his company, that there were blood stains on Ray's clothes, and that a pocket-piece found on Ray's person, and which was the property of the deceased, were factors that led him to believe the evidence was sufficient to commit the prisoner for trial.

Ray took the verdict coolly. In fact, when he heard the magistrate's decision he never turned a hair, and appeared to be as unconcerned as anyone in the court room.

Before he was taken to the jail, where he will be confined until the fall assizes in October, when he will be tried, his mother and sister talked with him as he stood in the dock. He took matters quietly and conversed with them until the constable beckoned to him that he was wanted.

ESSEX INDIGNANT OVER DISMISSAL

Inspector Scott Let Out To Please Disappointed Conservatives.

LEAMINGTON, July 16.—Thursday afternoon, the day following the meeting of the Conservative executive at Essex, where they talked so long about retaining the efficient fishery inspector in his position, M. W. Scott received from the department at Toronto, a letter dismissing him, stating that "Since he had not sent in his resignation as instructed, he could consider himself dismissed without further inquiry, dating from July 15."

"The haste in which this has been done is being commented upon by many of the leading Conservatives here, and nearly all Conservatives and Liberals are indignant over it. So strong is the feeling that it would be an easy matter to have an indignation meeting in the town over it. Mr. Scott is an old man, almost entirely dependent upon the small salary, and to be deprived of it, it is alleged, to gratify the political spleen of the man who happens to have the patronage in his hands."

He has proved himself to be a most efficient officer, faithful and honest, and he has made the largest yearly return ever made from this shore. Last year he collected for the department over \$3,000 at a salary of \$1,175.

The inspector at Pelee Island collected \$2,000 at a salary of \$400, and the inspector at Blenheim collected \$5,000 for a salary of \$600.

Charles Coullins, of Leamington, has been appointed in his place.
