As Berlin reported a thousand Canadian prisoners it is feared that a thousand of this rearguard was wiped out before exhaustion of ammunition compelled them to surrender.

# ATROCITY WITNESS NOW IN TORONTO

Belgian Refugee Saw Some Unarmed Men Shot Down.

HER FATHER MURDERED

Wounded Man Tells How King Takes Place in the Trenches.

[Special to The Advertiser.] TORONTO, May 2.-The first eyewitness story of German atrocity in fourteen Belgian refugees. Cardinal Mercier, head of the Catholic Church in Belgium, through Rev. Fr. 
