C., June 7 .- An Imperial Parliament, formed of representatives from all parts of the British Empire, is a dream impossible of realization at present, but the separate nations which compose the Empire should have representa tives at London to keep in constant touch with the British cabinet, Right Hon. J. W. Lowther, former speaker of the British House of Commons, declared in a speech before the Canadian Club yesterday. Mr. Lowther declared that Britain had absolutely no wish to force any form of any imperial organization on the dominions, nor could she do so, but he felt that a closer legislative union between the mem bers of the Empire in the future was essential.
