WANT EASTERN ROAD MANAGED FROM MONCTON

Maritime Province Members Launch Fierce Political Battle At Ottawa.

INTERVIEW PREMIER KING

May Produce Resolution and Stage Debate When Parliament Opens.

OTTAWA, Feb. 2.—(By Canadian Press).—The government tonight took steps to ratify, on behalf of Canada, the international convention for the suppression of traffic in women and children. This convention was signed on behalf of Canada at Geneva, on Sept. 30 last, by Hon. C. J. Doherty.

OTTAWA, Feb. 2.-With the arrival from Nova Scotia of E. M. Mac-donald and H. J. Logan, a fierce political fray has been launched here. In the hearts of the two Maritime Province members was a grim determination to effect the rescue of what in happier day was known as the Intercolonial Railway from the profane hands of the C. N. R. executive, and to restore it to its pristine glory as a separate system, managed from Moncton, N. B., in accordance with the best traditions of the Maritime Provinces.

Two other New Brunswick members, Messrs. Turgeon and A. T. Leger, arrived as their allies, and it was probably well that the ripe wisdom of the member for Gloucester was available as a moderating force. To the credit or discredit of the late Mr. Frank Cochrane must be placed the first breach with the old tradition, when he insisted on running the Intercolonial as a business proposition and not as a party workhouse. There was much wailing and gnashing of teeth among the faithful at Mr. Cochrane's eccentricities, and Mr. Stansfield, then a Tory whip and now a senator, resigned in protest against the unseemliness of the

new regime.

A Burning Issue.

But worse was to follow. When he Canadian National Railways came into existence it was decided that the C. R. should become part and parcel of the state system. No legislation was deemed necessary, but by an order-in-council it was handed over to the mercies of Mr. D. B. Hanna and his associates, and for the last three years the ultimate decisions upon matters affecting it have emanated from Toronto.

Such a state of affairs has aroused bitter heart-burning down by the shores of the Atlantic, and unending have been the lamentations about the terrible nature of the tragedy involved in this Toronto management. The local stalwarts almost forgot their partisan quarrels in uniting to lenounce the iniquity. When the federal campaign came on the fate of the I. C. R. had become a major

political issue. Mr. Fielding, Mr. A. K. MacLean and some others, did not indorse the agitation. But by the time, former Premier Meighen reached the Maritime Provinces he found the I. C. R. overshadowed all other issues, and his supporters presaged disaster unless some concessions to local sentiment, which was at fever heat,
