BRANT COUNTY

PLAN ADOPTED

Delegates Favor Plan To Form Higher School District Organizations.

New System To Be Optional Under Amended Acts of 1921.

TORONTO, July 5.—Representatives of a majority of the county councils of Ontario attended a special conference called by Hon. R. H. Grant, Ontario minister of education, to meet in the Normal School building here to consider the equalization of support of secondary schools throughout the province, and the extension of secondary school education.

At the afternoon session today, the conference, by what the chairman, High School Inspector G. F. Rogers, called a narrow majority, approved a new scheme known as the "Brant County Plan," which calls for the forming of county organizations, the latter and the county councils each to bear 50 per cent in supporting high and continuation schools. When the meeting resumes tomorrow morning the matter may be reopened and voted on again.

The motion for adopting the Brant plan was moved by J. Watt of Brantford. An amendment by J. Stewart of Parkhill, Ont., that county school organizations were not advantageous to the school work of Ontario, was defeated by a substantial majority.

Motion Ruled Out.
A motion by K. McKay, Elgin

COUNTY, for the conference to adjourn for a month before considering the Brant plan, was ruled out of order by the chairman, Inspector Rogers, who presided in place of Dr. Merchant, who was absent because of illness in his home. A. M. Burnham is secretary of the conference.

The Brant plan, which the conference approved was outlined as follows:

1. County organizations for high school purposes shall be made optional as provided for in the amendments of 1921 to the high schools act.

2. Where county organizations have been adopted, the county shall be divided into districts for the organization and support of secondary schools. Some of those districts may embrace high schools and others continuation schools, but no part of a county shall be outside of a school district.

Local Boards to Control.
3. The high schools and continuation schools within these districts shall be under the control of local boards constituted much as they are at present under the high schools act and the continuation schools act.

4. All secondary schools administered under a county organization shall be supported in part by the secondary school districts and in part by the county. The percentage of support will be fixed by statute, and to be the same in all counties where county organizations are adopted.

5. 50 per cent from the secondary schools, and 50 per cent from the county.

Mail Clerk Matte of Levis was killed, another mail clerk, name unknown here, was severely injured, and the engineer, Ollie Matthews, of the Campbellton, was seriously scalded.

ALTHOUGH the passengers were badly shaken up, none were killed.

The track was torn up for a long distance, and the wreckage had not been cleared away up to 1 o'clock this (Thursday) morning.
