

FASCISTI CHIEF ANNOUNCES NEW ITALIAN CABINET

Mussolini is Premier and Minister of Interior and Foreign Affairs.

NO DISORDERS OCCUR

Rome Eagerly Awaits Coming of Head of New Government.

PARIS, Oct. 30.—Benito Mussolini has formed a ministry for Italy, with himself as premier and minister of the interior and of foreign affairs, according to Rome advices this evening. General Diaz is minister of war and Vice-Admiral Di Revel minister of marine.

The new cabinet of Mussolini was announced this evening. Its make-up is:

Premier, minister of the interior and foreign affairs—Benito Mussolini.

Minister of war—General Armando Diaz.

Minister of marine—Vice-Admiral Thaon Di Revel.

Minister of the treasury—Prof. Luigi Einaudi (Nationalist).

Minister of industry—Theophile Rossi (Nationalist).

Minister of finance—Signor De Stefani (Fascist).

Minister of the colonies—Luigi Federzoni (Nationalist).

Minister of liberated regions—Signor Giurati (Fascist).

Minister of justice—Aldo Oviglio (Fascist).

Minister of education—Signor Gentile (Democrat).

Minister of agriculture—Luigi Capitanio (Fascist).

Minister of public works—Signor Carmassi (Nationalist).

Minister of posts and telegraphs—Signor Di Cesa (Nationalist).

Minister of social welfare—Stefano Cavazzoni (Catholic).

AWAITS MUSSOLINI.

ROME, Oct. 30.—The entire city was early astir awaiting the arrival of Mussolini. All Rome was flagged and the walls placarded with manifestoes, one of them, signed by the Fascist command, declaring:

"Victory is ours. Any conflict is useless, indeed harmful, to the Fascism. Therefore the most categorical orders Black Shirts imposing absolute calm, order and discipline. Mussolini having been intrusted with the formation of a cabinet, from this moment is responsible for the safety of the state, the ministries and parliament, and any action against the government institutions is rebellion against Mussolini. Attacks against shops and the selling of arms are absolutely prohibited."

The entire press praises King Victor Emmanuel for his firm attitude both in refusing to sign a decree for a state of siege, submitted to him by the retiring Fascist cabinet, and in choosing Benito Mussolini as head of the government. The Giornale d'Italia, says: "Five sovereigns of the House of Savoy have abdicated in the past for the safety of the mother country. The present king would have abdicated rather than a single drop of blood should have been shed in civil war."

EXPECT NO CHANGES.

LONDON, Oct. 30.—British official quarters look for no important change in Italy's foreign policy under the new regime and are confident that the reconstituted government in Rome will maintain the friendliest relations with Great Britain.

News dispatches from Rome have emphasized the entirely pacific character of the movement, the nature of which is given as loyalty to the throne and devotion to the cause of national reconstruction and prosperity.

The Fascist element in the new cabinet, it is believed, will be balanced by the inclusion of members of the popular, or Catholic party, and Mussolini's presence in the government is expected to exert a moderating influence on his followers throughout Italy.

The Turkish peace conference at Lausanne is not likely to be affected by the changes at Rome, and the delegates from Italy are expected to be on hand when the meeting opens.

Last Survivor of Immortal "Light Brigade"



ELLIS CUTTING, SURVIVOR OF GALLANT SIX HUNDRED.

CEDAR RAPIDS, Ia., Oct. 31.—Ellis Cutting, sole survivor of the famous "Charge of the Light Brigade," rode unscathed through that gallant action to be hurt by a snowplow near here.

Today, 68 years after the immortal exploit of "blundered orders," Cutting, 85, is alive and alert. He recalls, as though it were yesterday, the charge at Balaklava, in which he participated as a youth of 17, the charge of the Light Brigade.

With the Crimean war in progress—Britain and France allied with Turkey against Russia—the Russians attacked the allies at Balaklava Oct. 25, 1854, hoping to cut allied communications.

The "Heavy Brigade" of British cavalry made a furious charge, swept back the attackers and drove them back behind their own artillery.

Blunder Apparent.

The "Light Brigade" commanded by Lord Cardigan, then received orders to charge these cannon and prevent their removal. For cavalry, mounted and armed with lances and sabres, to charge cannon was plainly suicidal. Lord Cardigan read the order, questioned the aide delivering

"Forward, the Light Brigade!" commanded Lord Raglan. Unquestioning, the 600 troopers galloped forward, guidons flying, sabres flashing.

Beyond the allied lines, Russian artillery fired point blank from three sides into the gallant horsemen, in which he participated as a youth of 17, the charge of the Light Brigade.

Charge, suddenly dashed across the front of the chargers, possibly to swerve the troops from the death trap. A shell made him the first to fall.

Guns Are Taken.

Straight at the enemy guns out in front rode Cardigan's command. The numbers dwindled rapidly as converging cannon fire swept them.

The guns were reached, silenced. Small parties even attacked the cavalry behind. But a battle against such overwhelming odds could only end in annihilation. Other cavalry arrived in time to hold the ground won by the Light Brigade.

Most historians say a third of the Light Brigade survived. Cutting, though, says only six came out alive. Lord Cardigan was one of these.
