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THE ESTIMATES OF GRAIN GREATER

Figures Given in Bulletin Show Large Increase From Last Year

Ottawa, Oct. 15.—A bulletin issued to-day by the Census and Statistics Office of the Department of Trade and Commerce gives a provisional estimate of the yield of the principal grain crops and also the average quality of these crops at harvest time.

During the month ended September 30th, ideal weather for the ingathering of the grain crops prevailed over all Canada. In the greater part of Ontario and in the Western provinces, harvesting operations were well completed by the middle of September, and only in parts of Quebec and the Maritime provinces, where the spring opens later, was harvesting carried on during the latter end of the month.

The estimates given a month ago are slightly greater than those now issued, which may be presumed to be based more or less on results of threshing. The final estimates based altogether on threshing results, and calculated on corrected areas will be issued as usual on December 15th.

For spring wheat the estimate for the end of September is 188,468,000 bushels as compared with 182,840,000 bushels last year. For fall wheat the estimate is 19,107,000 bushels, as against 16,396,000 bushels last year, and 18,481,000 bushels in the preliminary estimate this year. The total estimated wheat production this year is therefore 207,575,000 bushels as compared with 199,236,000 bushels last year, an increase of 8,339,000 bushels, or 4 1/4 per cent. The yield per acre for all wheat is 21.15 bushels as compared with 20.32 bushels last year. Oats show a total yield of 391,418,000 bushels, and an average yield of 40.67 bushels as compared with 391,733,000 bushels and an average yield of 39.25 bushels. Barley gives an estimated total yield of 44,348,000 and an average of 30.09 bushels per acre, as compared with 44,014,000 bushels and an average of 31.10 bushels in 1912. For this year the total production of rye is 2,559,000 bushels, of peas 3,974,000 bushels, of buckwheat 7,900,000 bushels, of flax 14,912,000 bushels, of mixed grains, 17,178,000 bushels, of corn for husking 14,086,000 bushels, of beans 889,500 bushels as compared with a total yield last year for rye of 2,594,000 bushels, for peas 3,773,500 bushels, for buckwheat of 10,193,000 bushels, for flax of 21,681,500 bushels, for mixed grains of 27,952 bushels, for corn for husking of 16,609,900 bushels, for beans of 1,040,800 bushels.

For the three Northwest provinces, the total yield of spring wheat is estimated at 183,852,000 bushels, of fall wheat at 5,264,000 bushels, of oats at 230,595,000 bushels, of barley at 26,904,000 bushels, of rye at 686,000 bushels, of flax at 14,808,000 bushels.

The average quality of these crops measured upon a per cent basis of 100 as representing grain well headed, well filled, well saved and unaffected to any appreciable extent by frost, rust, smut, etc., is as follows:—spring wheat 89.17, oats 90.52, barley 88.25, rye 85.41, peas 81.71, beans 78.48, buckwheat 73.40, mixed grains, 90.59, flax 82.68, corn for husking 73.16. Of these wheat, oats, barley and rye are above the average quality for either of the last two years.

The potato and root crops continue to show good figures, as representing average condition during growth. The condition of potatoes is 83.59, turnips 82.62, mangolds 83.62, sugar beets 82.63.

FIRST MEETING OF COMMISSIONERS

Large Number of Beer Licences Granted to Applicants.

On Tuesday evening the first meeting of the Liquor License Commissioners was held in the Council Chambers. Thomas Ellsworth, chairman, J. Howe Taylor and Joseph Pichette present.

Applications were received and read from the following beer licensees: D. R. Keddy, A. McG. McDonald, Francis X. Boudreau, J. Isaac Boudreau, Wm. J. Lurette, Walter H. Gray, Robert Graham, Daniel Maddin, Martin J. Malley, Mrs. John Galant, Jeremiah Hallihan, Ferdinand Belanger, Samuel Francoeur and Chas. Goss.

Moved by J. H. Taylor and seconded by Joseph Pichette that these applicants be granted a beer license under "the Liquor License Act." Motion carried, moved by J. Howe Taylor and seconded by Joseph Pichette that in future "Liquor License Inspector, Charles W. Hughes," be given authority to issue beer licenses to applicants. Motion carried. Moved and seconded that the meeting adjourn. Carried.

The Chief of Police was instructed to prosecute all those selling beer and had not made application for license. The fine in this is the same as for selling liquor without a license, viz., \$50 for the first offense.

COUNCIL MEETING ON TUESDAY NIGHT

Delegates Appointed to Attend Convention of Municipalities At Moncton

A meeting of the Town Council was held on Tuesday evening. His Worship Mayor Andrew presiding over a full board of councillors.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.

A communication was read from the secretary of the National Municipal League inviting the town to send delegates to the annual meeting at Toronto in November. Letter filed.

Communication read from W. D. Lighthall, secretary of N.B. Municipalities calling attention to the meetings of the National League. Letter filed.

Communication from Auburn Nurseries offering to sell trees for decorative purposes to the town, was referred to Educational and Improvements committee.

A communication from Archd. McKenzie regarding the freezing of the main opposite his house on Union Terrace last year, and requesting the water department to take steps to prevent a recurrence of the same this year. Referred to Water and Sewerage Committee.

A communication read from A. J. LeBlanc, clerk of Dalhousie town, asking if they could be supplied with a carload of coal, and also asking if the town could sell them 100 tons. Referred to Electric Light Committee.

A communication read from Mr. W. J. Smith regarding the janitorship of the new town buildings. Letter was laid on the table. Councillor White from Fire Protection Committee presented report recommending payment of accounts amounting to \$13.18. Report was received and adopted.

Councillor White from the Electric Light Committee submitted report recommending that the account of Mr. W. W. Doherty for \$6.10 be paid. Report received and adopted.

Councillor Quinn from Public Charities committee submitted report recommending the payment of accounts amounting to \$101.25.

Councillor Lunan from Police and License committee submitted report recommending that Mr. W. O. Chamberlain be appointed policeman at a salary of \$50 per month, said appointment to be from month to month at the pleasure of the council.

Councillor Pinault from Public Property and Streets committee submitted report recommending payment of accounts totalling \$85.84. Reports received and adopted.

Councillor Alexander submitted report of Water and Sewerage committee recommending payments of accounts amounting to \$86.33. Report was received and adopted.

Councillor Ferguson and the Town Clerk were appointed delegates to attend the convention of N. B. Municipalities.

The Mayor and Town Clerk were empowered to execute lease from Gertrude Murray and M. A. Kelly administrator of Wm. Murray's estate for lease of Murray block when approved by the Public Property and Street committee.

Mr. Max. M. Mowat was granted the privilege of hauling out his boat, and erecting a boat house on the town property near the foot of Prince William Street, at the rental of \$10 per year. Boat house to be removed whenever requested to do so by the council.

The Town Clerk was authorized to rent a compartment in the vault of the Bank of Nova Scotia at a rental of \$12 per year.

It was resolved to allow the Judge of the County Court and the Judge of the Probate Court the use of the council chambers in the Murray building when not in use for other purposes.

A keen discussion was indulged in with regard to fire alarm matters, and at the end, the chairman of the Electric Light committee was instructed to have Mr. Farrer charge the batteries in connection with the fire alarm system and get the same in proper running order.

To increase the efficiency of the Fire Department, the chairman of the committee was instructed to procure prices on one horse and a pair of horses and report back to council at next meeting.

The delegates who will attend the convention of the Municipalities at Moncton were instructed to extend an invitation to the Union to hold their next convention at Campbellton.

Council then adjourned.
