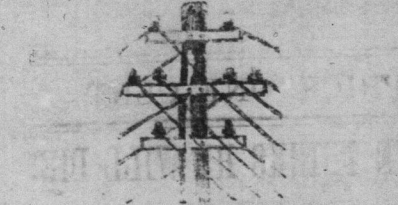

European Anarchists in America.

Unusually lies the head that wears a crown," so wrote Shakespeare a few centuries ago, and the saying seems to have been more force than it had then.

Next after that came the outbreak of 1848, which quickly ended in smoke, and led up to Louis Napoleon's mischievous coup d'etat of December 2, and left the rule of the sword stronger than before.

Count Kalnoky points out that this outbreak of terrorism began immediately after the publication in the seditious papers of Vienna of the proceedings of the socialist congress, which was held at Pittsburgh last November, which was controlled and directed by John Most, and which distinctly advocated assassination and the destruction of public and private property to avenge the so-called wrongs of the people; and that among the papers found in the possession of the anarchists Kennel, Schultz, Fossak, and Lissa, lately expelled from Switzerland, were letters and instructions from Most; that the money stolen from Herr Finkert had been forwarded to Most, and that Finkert, the socialist editor of the recently suppressed paper Zukunft (the Future), was about to sail from London to join Most in New York.

We should prefer to have seen a Canadian at the head of our military organization; but as an imperial officer has been named to the post we are none the less pleased that we are to have a good one at Col. Middleton is sure to prove.

Republic is little esteemed by them; except for the opportunity it affords for conspiracy and agitation unmoored. Political freedom, as we understand it, is not what these men want. They have no more liking for constitutional government than a tiger would have for a feed of hay and oats.
