

# THE TURCO OF THE COMMUNE.

From the French of Alphonse Daudet.  
He was a little drummer in the native sharpshooters. His name was Kadour, he came from the tribe of Djendel, was one of that handful of Turcos who entered Paris in the train of the army of Vinoy. From Wissembourg to Champagne he had taken part in the whole campaign, crossing the fields of battle like a storm bird, with his steel clappers and his derbuka (Arabian drum) as quiet as a reed, and the balls did not know where to find him. But when the winter came, this little bronze African, reddened with the fire of the grape shot, could not endure the nights of grand guard, standing motionless in the snow, and one January morning he was picked up on the bank of the Marne by the cold and both his feet frozen. He was a long time in the hospital. It was there that I saw him for the first time.

Set and patient as a sick dog, the Turco looked about him with big, gentle eyes. When any one spoke to him he smiled and showed his teeth. It was all that he could do, for he did not know where to find him, could scarcely speak the sabir, an Algerian dialect of mixed Provençal, Italian and Arabian, a medley of words picked up like shells along all the Latin seas. To amuse him Kadour had nothing but his derbuka. From time to time, when he was weary of lying still, they took him to him on his bed, and allowed him to play on it, but not too loud, on account of the other patients. Then his poor black face, so dull, extinguished as it was by the yellow daylight and the gloomy winter landscape which appeared through the window, grew animated, grained, and followed all the movements of the rhythm. Sometimes he beat a charge, and the lightning of his white teeth passed into a furious laugh; or his eyes grew moist as some Mussulman air, his nostrils swelled, and through the sickly odor of the hospital, in the midst of the sickly odor of the hospital, he saw once more the woods of Blidah laden with oranges, and the little Moor, robed in white and perfumed with rose.

Two months passed thus. In these two months Kadour had done many things, but Kadour knew nothing of them. Under his window he had heard pass to lead his disarmed troops returning to the city; later the cannons went rolling by from morning to night, then the looting, the carnage. Of all this he understood nothing except that they were always at war, and that he would soon be left to fight, because his legs were cured. Soon he left his drum on his back, in search of his company. He did not seek long. The federalists who were passing by, he followed them, after a long examination, as they could get nothing from him but "Bono bono, macché bono," the general of the day ended by giving him a franc and an omnibus horse, and attaching him to his staff.

In these staffs of the commune there was a little of everything—red liveries, Polish cloaks, Hungarian jackets, sailors' blouses, and gold, velvet, tinsel and lace trimmings. In his blue waistcoat, embroidered with yellow, his turban, his derbuka, the Turco completed the masquerade. Delighted to find himself in such pleasant company, intoxicated with the sunlight, the confusion of arms and uniforms, the confusion of the war against Prussia, but with some inexpressible addition of animation, of color, of life, he was a conscious deserter mingled in the great Parisian bacchanalia, and was one of the celebrities of the moment. Everywhere he went the federalists hurried at him, welcomed him. The commune was so proud of possessing him that it placed him on exhibition, showed him off, wore him like a decoration. Twenty times a day the headquarters sent him to the war office, the war office to the hotel de Ville. For they had been told by the Turco that their sailors were counterfeit sailors, their artillerymen counterfeit artillerymen. At least this was a true Turco. To be convinced of it was only necessary to look at the excited monkey-like face and the barbaric look of the little body throwing itself about on the big horse in all the wildest contortions of Arabian horsemanship.

Nevertheless, there was something wanting to the happiness of Kadour. He would have liked to fight, to make the powder talk. Unfortunately, under the commune, as under the empire, the staff officers were not often used. With out reviews and without parades, the poor Turco passed his time on the Place Vendôme, or in the courtyard of the minister of war, in the midst of those murky caresses of fustian and bayonets, on the fall of barrels of brandy always on tap, hogheads of bacon with the head knocked out, fests where the balls whistled round the still felt. Too good a Mussulman to take part in these orgies, Kadour kept apart, sober and quiet, made his ablutions in a corner, prepared his kouskous with a handful of grits, then, after a little air on his drum, he rolled himself in his burrows, and fell asleep on some flight of steps by the bivouac fire.

One morning in the month of May the Turco was awakened by a terrible firing. The headquarters were in confusion; every one was moving, fleeing. Mechanically he did as the others did, leaped on his horse and followed the crowd. The streets were full of bewildered trumpeters, of struggling battalions. People were tearing up paving stones, building barricades. Near the quay the fusillade was more distinct, the tumult greater. On the bridge of the Cordeliers Kadour lost the staff. A little further on he took his horse from him. It was for an eight-branded soldier, in a great hurry to see what was going on at the Hotel de Ville. Furious, the Turco began to run in the direction of the battle. As he ran he loaded his chapsort and said: "Macché bono, Brislan!" for to his mind it was the Prussians who had forced an entrance. Already the balls whistled round the obelisk, in the foliage of the Tuilleries. At the barricade of the Rue de Rivoli the avengers of Orleans called to him, "Hey! Turco! Turco!" There were not more than a dozen of them, but Kadour alone was worth a whole army.

Standing on the barricade, erect and confident as a flag, he fought, leaping and shouting, under a hail of shot. At one moment the curtain of smoke which covered the earth dispersed, a little between two cannonades, and he saw red trousers massed in the Champs Elysees. Afterward everything became confused again. He thought he must have been deceived again, and again made the powder talk eloquently.

Suddenly the barricade became silent. The last artilleryman had fled, leaving his last shot. But the Turco did not move. Lying in wait, ready for a spring, he set his bayonet firmly, and watched for the pointed helmets. It was the troops of the line that arrived! Through the hollow noise of the charge the officers shouted: "Surrender!"

The Turco for a moment was stupefied, then he rushed forward, his gun in the air—"Bono, bono, Francese!"

Vaguely in his savage brain he fancied that this was the army of deliverance, under Faidherbe or Chanzy, that the Prussians had so long expected. How happy he was; how he laughed at them with all his white teeth. In a twinkling the bar-

ricade was over-run. They surrounded him, they turn him about.  
"Show your gun."  
He was still warm.  
"Show your hands."  
His hands were black with powder. And the Turco showed them proudly with the same happy smile.  
Then they pushed him against the wall, and—crash!  
He was dead, without knowing anything about it.

## THE BANK OF TORONTO.

The annual general meeting of the Bank of Toronto (being the twenty-seventh since the commencement of business) was held in pursuance of the terms of the charter, at the banking house of the institution, June 18, 1884.

On the motion of BARLOW CUMBERLAND, Esq., seconded by Charles Stuart, Esq., George Gooderham, Esq., was called to the chair, and Mr. Coulson requested to act as secretary.

By request of the Chairman the Cashier then read the following REPORT:

The Directors of the Bank of Toronto have pleasure in meeting the stockholders for the purpose of reporting on the operations of the bank for the year just closed. The year has been characterized by a marked reaction from the expansion that prevailed in the business of the country during several of the preceding years.

The harvest of 1883 proved to be an exceptionally poor one, whilst a depression in the lumber and timber trades, and an excess of output in the manufacturing industries necessitated a large curtailment in production. These and other causes resulted in a considerable diminution in the amount of banking accommodation availed of throughout the country. Of this diminution the Bank of Toronto has borne its share, thereby suffering to some extent a decrease in earnings.

The losses of the year, which, considering the circumstances, were moderate, have all been written off, and debts of a doubtful character at the time of making up the annual balance sheet continue to be provided for as in previous years.

After these provisions had been made it gave the Directors satisfaction to be able to declare the same distribution to the shareholders as they did a year ago, as well as to add a further sum to the reserve account.

The following statement shows the result of the year's business:
