But when the winter came, this little bronze African, reddened with the fire of the grape shot, could not endure the nights of grand guard, standing motionless in the snow, and one January morning he was picked up on the bank of the Marne distorted with the cold and both his feet frozen. He was a long time in the hospital. It was there that I saw him for the first time.

Sad and patient as a sick dog, the Turco looked about him with big, gentle eyes. When any one spoke to him he smiled and showed his teeth.
