NOTE AND COMMENT

Over two hundred managers, tellers and clerks in the Quebec banks formed a national union of bank employees in Quebec recently. Their idea is to spread the movement all over Canada to merge the thousands of bank employees into a mammoth union for the recognition of their demands.

The British Government is effecting settlement with American munition steel workers so far as possible in some instances on the basis of scrap prices at \$30 a ton for the output on hand. This means a loss to the British Government of \$40 a ton, as the munition steel was sold at 3½ cents a pound. Manufacturers look on this allowance for the steel as generous, as owing to its high carbon content it cannot be satisfactorily reworked.
