UNIVERSITY EXTENSION LECTURES.

Splendid Addresses by Premier Armstrong and by Prof. M. S. Bancroft.

The University Extension Lecture Course, being delivered under the auspices of the Bridgetown Boy's Work Board, got away to a good start last Tuesday evening in the United Church Schoolroom, when Professor M. S. Bancroft, of Acadia University, (Professor of Geology) gave a lecture on "The Search of the Ocean."

The Course proper, however, has received a particularly auspicious preface the previous Tuesday evening, in the vestry of the Baptist church when under the same auspices, the Hon. E. H. Armstrong, Premier of Nova Scotia, gave a most interesting description of his recent visit to England and other parts of Europe, to a full house.

At the outset, Premier Armstrong, said he could not claim to be a lecturer. He simply wanted to tell his hearers (because he had been asked to do so) in an intimate way, of some of the things he saw, the people he met, and the impressions he received, on what to him, was a never-to-be-forgotten experience.

Let us, (merely for the sake of argument) allow the claim of the Premier to be no lecturer in the usual sense of the term. It is yet safe to say, he has the happy faculty of making you see through his eyes what he saw, and then wish you could actually see for yourself, and this is an art not given to every lecturer.

Certain it is, that when Mr. Armstrong had finished talking, the audience had no idea how time had taken.

Starting from Quebec, he had taken them across the ocean in a palatial C. P. R. steamer, the appointments and service of which left nothing to be desired. He had landed them at Southampton, where they saw docks and shipping facilities unsurpassed in the whole world.

Thence he had taken them in a non-stop train through some of the loveliest country-side imaginable to London at the rate of sixty miles an hour. Again he had shown them a marvellous sight of efficiency in the London terminal. After teaching London, he took them almost immediately

ly to a Royal Garden party at Buckingham Palace, there to be introduced to their Majesties the King and Queen, H. R. H. the Prince of Wales and other notables, and incidentally to learn somewhat of the secret of the hold of Royalty and hereditary privilege on democratic England. This done, he took them on shopping excursions in Piccadilly and Oxford Circus. And such shops! The like had not been seen before nor such courteous service experienced. Then a ride on the top of a bus and a sight of traffic scarcely imaginable unless seen. Then came other trips to the English country-side. The cottager's beautiful gardens and lovely flowers. The landed estates with their magnificent houses and hoary traditions and, what must strike the eye of every visitor to England for the first time, the turf of the English lawn. The audience saw it all. Then a trip was made across the English Channel to Calais and thence, via Paris, to the battlefields regions and the war-grave cemeteries. Again the description was intimate to a degree, and it must have been a source of consolation to any present, who had the mortal remains of a boy lying "over there," to know of the care being taken of their resting places.

In due course the audience were brought back to Nova Scotia to which in concluding, the speaker paid a worthy tribute, as having much of which to be proud, and as abounding with opportunities.

Prolonged applause showed the appreciation of the audience as the speaker sat down. This was again evidenced on a vote of thanks, moved by Canon Underwood, and seconded by the Rev. J. H. Freestone, being put by the Chairman of the Board, the Rev. P. R. Hayden.

The second lecture in the Course was given by Professor M. S. Bancroft, was well attended and the speaker brought out many interesting facts on what is generally considered a rather dry subject even if it were the "Search of the Ocean." Mr. Bancroft dealt not with life in the ocean but with the bed of ocean, the geological formations, etc.

Were there 10 per cent less water in the ocean there would be 10,000,000 more acres of undersea areas, become land surface. With an increase of 10 per cent in the waters of ocean half of North America would be under water. Depressions in ocean were discussed. The greatest depth of water is somewhat greater than the height of the highest mountains.

At the close a hearty vote of thanks was moved by Mr. O. S. Miller, harrier, and seconded by Rev. J. H. Freestone.

The next lecture in the course takes place on Thursday evening of this week in the Baptist church vestry and will be given by Rev. R. B. Liddy, B.D., Ph.D., Professor of Psychology and Philosophy of Mt. Allison University. Subject: "Prevention of Crime."

OBITUARY.

Charles Forbes Tupper.

Clementsport.—On Sunday evening of last week, one of Clementsport's most beloved citizens in the person of Charles Forbes Tupper, passed away.

Born at Round Hill in 1877, son of the late C. B. B. and Margaret Tupper, Mr. Tupper spent his boyhood and youth in his native village, and received his education in its public school. He later taught school for several years at Clementsvalle and Port Gilbert.

In 1902 he married Harriet O. Millett, daughter of Alexander and Melissa Millett, of Clementsvalle, with whom they resided two or three years coming to Clementsport about twenty years ago.

For sixteen years Mr. Tupper was clerk of Herbert Hicks, general merchant of this place. He was called upon for all kinds of public service and during the war did his "bit" without stint in all the great drives.

In public school and church matters he took an active part, serving for some years as Trustee of the public schools and Superintendent of the Sunday School in the Methodist church, though himself a member of the Presbyterian congregation at Annapolis.

Failing health compelled his retirement four years ago. Later he opened a small store and the last two years, with the assistance of his wife, opened his home to the public under the name of the Lucerne House.

Though confined to the house since November he did not have to keep his bed and passed away at the last without warning while seated in his chair.

The funeral service on Wednesday was conducted by Rev. M. H. MacIntosh, of Annapolis, assisted by Rev. James W. Smith, of the Baptist church, and the Rev. A. W. L. Smith, Rector of St. Clements. The burial arrangements were under the direction of the Masonic Order of which the deceased was a Royal Arch member.

The Masonic Ritual at the house and the grave was taken by fellow members of Annapolis Royal Lodge, A. F. and A. M. No. 32.

The teachers, pupils and trustees of the public schools attended in a body. Flaws were flown at half mast all over the village, and the whole citizenship united in rendering a most impressive tribute to the memory of a beloved citizen.

In addition to his widow, a daughter, Edna Beth; a son, James Howard, one brother, Elias, of Bridgewater, and a sister, Mrs. Lewis Rice, Minneapolis, survive him. His only other brother, Major J. H. Tupper, of the 25th Battalion, was killed at Courcellette.

Mrs. Avar Beeler and Mrs. O. P. Covert, of Bridgetown, are sisters of Mrs. Tupper.

Mr. Tupper was a life-long Liberal and to the party gave the same loyal service that characterized his life in other respects.
