Our opinion is that shippers of choice stock can sleep with easy minds, whilst those who know their parcels to be wanting have good cause for uneasiness. The strong demand throughout the country continues, and the close yesterday was sound and healthy."

FRUIT.—There is a fair jobbing demand for green fruit, and prices are unchanged. The demand for dried fruit has fallen off somewhat, but this is believed to be only temporary. Importers report their stocks in small compass, and prices both for currants and raisins are essentially

.The market for refined sugar is very firm in sympathy with the

strong upward tandency of the raw product, as refiners could not at the present moment lay it down at the price they are now selling their low grade yellows. Therefore an advance in these grades is imperative if a living profit is to be obtained. There has been considerable excitement in raw sugar during the past few days both in England and the United States, beet augar being cabled from London strong and advancing at a rise of  $7\frac{1}{2}$ 1., November being quoted at 14s. 3d. and December at 14s.  $4\frac{1}{2}$ d. Another private cable from London reported the market excited amid the most rampant speculation, certain operators having been as anxious to buy as the most rabid "bull" in the Chicago wheat pit during the manipulation of an attempted corner. The present active buying in England at rapid advance. ing values is partly owing to the generally understood opinion that Licht will again reduce his estimate of the European best crop. The wave of excitement in England appears to have struck the American market in doad earnest, causing an advance in raw sugar in New York of &c. to 3-16c. per lb. Brazil markets are strong and higher, as the nome refiners are paying more than Americans or Canadians can afford to pay, and to-day the Brazil product is worth 1s. 6d. per cwt. more than what it was offered to Canadian refiners a few weeks ago. The outlook for raw augar portends higher prices still, and refined will no doubt have to follow in its wake.

Molassis.—It has been found that the stocks of molasses in this market or expected here are considerably less than was estimated and, consequently, great firmness prevails. In Montreal molasses is quiet but holders of Barbadoes and other West Indian brands are meeting with considerable competition, a very fair brand of New Orleans selling freely in a jobbing way at 28½c. to 30c. This molasses is put up in barrels and is considerably above the average New Orleans product which has reached that market. Barbadoes is quoted at 371c. there.

TEAS.—There is a fairly active demand for the better grades of Japan teas but low qualities are not much enquired for. Blacks are also moving more freely and the English market, which has had a downward tend for the past few weeks, has steadied up and an improvement in the demand is looked forward to in this market.

Coffee. The disturbances in Brazil have occasioned a change in the coffee market, for buyers are beginning to feel anxious about supplies in view of the small reserves that they have to fall back on. This anxiety has precipitated a sudden movement from first hands. The New York Commercial Bulletin reports that market as follows:—" Operators are becoming somewhat perplexed over the market for Santos grades. A great deal of it has been handled this month both on spot and to arrive, and cost has worked up to a pretty full level, with an apparent effect to increase the offerings from other sources quite liberally. This existing fact, and the belief that whatever may be the result of the political troubles in Brazil there will be a desire to realize upon coffee somewhat promptly, is having a tendency to induce many buyers to pause and abstain from investments

likely to increase their actual present holdings."

FISH.—The fish market remains in the same lethargic condition that it has been for several weeks. A very fair lot of haddock struck in this week to the banks off the shore to the westward of this place, and it is estimated that about 100,000 lbs. were taken. Most of these were purchased by one firm in this city, who packed them fresh and forwarded them to Montrual, Quebec and Toronto, where a good demand for them is said to exist. There has been no other movement worth noting in this market. Our outside advices are as follows:—Montreal, November 25.—"The market has been quiet, but the firm feeling has been maintained, and there is no change to note. Herring continue scarce with holders stiff, and B. C. salmon and lake trout which have been arriving have been taken at steady prices with sufficient freedom to prevent any accumulation. Cod, etc., rule firm and unchanged." A Montreal paper says:—"The small quantity of herring on spot as well as to arrive, and the bare condition of primary markets have induced one of our city dealers to secure all the available supplies to arrive by last steamer, namely, Greetlands, which is due here on Saturday next. The total quantity of Labrador herring, it is estimated, will not exceed 1,500 bbls. in round figures, and taking into consideration the great scarcity of herring and the abundance of potatoes, present prices are considered very reasonable. Sales have been made at \$5.25 to \$5.75 per bbl. Chicago men who have been holding out against present prices will, it is thought after all see their way to take a portion of the herring available in this market, which at the most will be very small. British Columbia and Winnipeg are also enquiring for supplies A singular feature in the position is that prices in Quebec are actually higher than in this market, and enquiries have been received from the ancient capital within the past few days." Fish prices in Montreal are quoted as follows:—"Labrador herring have been placed during the week at \$5.25 to \$5.50, Cape Breton at \$5.75 to \$6, and shore herring at \$5 to at \$5.25 to \$5.50, Cape Breton at \$5.70 to \$6, and snore nerring at \$5 to \$5.25.
