

a university degree. Nurses, technicians, accountants, stenographers and a great many other skilled persons are required, although there is a particularly heavy demand for teachers with university training.

I would hope that within one or two years we can have as many as 1,000 young Canadians serving abroad in developing countries.

One of the first tasks of the Company of Young Canadians will be to study and assess the many requirements which will be involved in preparing for this great expansion in the numbers of young Canadians serving abroad in programmes of international development such as CUSO.

The Company of Young Canadians will work in the closest possible co-ordination and co-operation with CUSO and I would hope that within a short time there can be some announcement made about further developments in this exciting area which I am confident will capture the imagination of all Canadians.
