matter within the control of the Department of National Revenue. My understanding is that they will receive what stands to their credit in the fund.

Mr. MacLEAN: So far as the province of Prince Edward Island is concerned, quite a number of men in the preventive force will not be transferred to the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. The chief of the preventive service, Mr. George Barbour, is being let out with a number of others. They have contributed to the superannuation fund for a number of years, and it would be most unfair to them and to other men in similar positions throughout Canada if the money was not returned.

Mr. GUTHRIE: There will be no injustice done; that has been arranged.

Section agreed to.

## UNEMPLOYMENT RELIEF

AGREEMENTS WITH PROVINCES RESPECTING MEASURES TO RELIEVE DISTRESS

The house resumed from Thursday, April 28, consideration in committee of the following proposed resolution-Mr. Gordon-Mr. Quinn in the chair:

Resolved, that it is expedient to bring in a measure to authorize the governor in council to enter into agreements with all or any of the provinces respecting relief measures in such province or provinces; and to pay out of the consolidated revenue fund such sums as in his discretion may be required to meet the obliga-tions created by such agreements; to provide for special requirements in the national parks and in the drought stricken areas of the province of Saskatchewan; to assist in defraying the cost of the sale and distribution of products of field, farm, sea, river and mine; to loan money to any province on such terms as may be agreed upon and to guarantee the repayment of moneys borrowed by such province and to assist any province in any way that may be deemed neces-sary or advisable to provide for the relief of distress and the support and maintenance of those requiring assistance, and to loan money to and guarantee the payment of money by any public corporation or undertaking.

Mr. HEENAN: Is it the intention of the government to discontinue work on the highways through northern Ontario? Is there any understanding with the Ontario government in that regard?

Hon. W. A. GORDON (Minister of Labour): The highways through northern Ontario are built under what is known as the northern development branch of the province of Ontario, and money has also been spent in the past and is still being spent on what is known as the trans-Canada highway. As regards the work on the provincial roads, I have no other information than that which is probably common to all of us. I have no doubt that the provincial works there will be carried on as formerly. With respect to the trans-Canada highway, I think that the work there will be carried on this summer, and it will be
