Mr. Stanley Knowles (Winnipeg North Centre): Madam Speaker, in just a very few words I should like to commend the hon. member for Burnaby-Richmond-Delta (Mr. Reynolds) for bringing this matter before the House at this time. I am also pleased that he has withdrawn his bill and given us a resolution instead. I say that, if for no other reason than because the resolution has a chance of being passed, and I think it is better for the House to say yes this afternoon than for it just to talk a matter out and leave it at that.

I want also to underline the view expressed by the hon. member for Cochrane (Mr. Stewart) when he said that it is important that we do more than indulge in rhetoric. If we want to show appreciation of the youth of Canada we must be very specific. I will put it in as tight a nutshell as I can. I believe that if we want to show appreciation of our youth we must see to it that the Canada in which they are living and the Canada of the future will be one in which there is full employment, along with equal educational and cultural opportunities for all. It must be a place in which the housing needs of young people and their families, now and in the decades to come, are met. It must be a country in which there is full and complete health care and security down the road. It must also be a country and a world in which the air and the water are clean and where there is a secure peace. These are the kinds of things we ought to work very hard for if we really want to show appreciation of our Canadian youth.
