other parties in this country, if we can stimulate private investment—and in this particular case it will be up to \$150 million—then surely this is the way to go. The government of Canada in recent meetings have said, "It is the private sector that must create jobs, it is not the government." This is an example of where the private sector along with assistance from the federal and provincial governments, will have a tremendous impact that will directly affect the city of Nanaimo to the tune of 2,000 jobs.

There are several other things that perhaps do not get said, because when one talks about Bill C-14 or amendments to the Unemployment Insurance Act, one must take it in the context of what is happening throughout the entire economic sector of Canada. One cannot take it only in the context that this bill will be a reduction of funds to people who are unemployed in Canada. Instead one must ask the question, to what better use can we put those funds? I would suggest that the Minister of Employment and Immigration has taken the right step in attempting to break the unemployment cycle. Instead of putting more and more money into the program, as you put it into a beast with an unending appetite, you tend to break that cycle by having money go into more important areas.

Mr. James A. McGrath (St. John's East): Mr. Speaker, I can well understand why hon, members opposite would try to deprive me of the few minutes that are remaining. Having just listened to the speech of the hon. member for Comox-Alberni (Mr. Anderson), I can understand why closure has been introduced. A few more speeches like that and not even the Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister of Employment and Immigration (Mr. Maine) would vote for this bill. I am sure, when the hon, member speaks of his druthers, if the people of Comox-Alberni had their druthers, they would not send the hon. member here to make speeches like that.

There are only a few minutes remaining. Throughout this debate one important fact has been forgotten, that we are talking about the lives of people. This cruel bill will deprive 250,000 Canadians of the right to draw unemployment insurance. It will force a quarter million Canadians on to the welfare rolls of this country. There is nothing more can be said about this bad bill which was brought in by closure and forced through this House by closure. The final word on this iniquitous, unjust legislation will be left to the people of Canada when they vote this government out of office.
