MENINGOCOCCAL DISEASE TEST KIT

Hon. William Rompkey (Labrador): Mr. Speaker, about a year ago Mrs. Wanda Quigley of Wabush, Labrador, circulated a petition across Canada which attracted over 25,000 signatures with regard to the production of a test kit for meningococcal disease. She lost a child to that dreaded disease.

This petition is presented on behalf of a large number of people in the province of Nova Scotia who call upon Parliament to urge the government to obtain ownership of the test kit and to have the situation with Health and Welfare Canada resolved so that the test kit can be on the market and available to Canadians.

SERIAL KILLER BOARD GAME

Mr. Chris Axworthy (Saskatoon—Clark's Crossing): Mr. Speaker, in accordance with Standing Order 36, I have the privilege to present a petition to this House dealing with violence on television.

Many studies have shown a link between violence in entertainment and desensitization to violence in our society. Hundreds of children, women and men are

killed and are subject to inhumanities as a result. In particular, part of the culture of violence is the serial killer board game that comes with a bag of 25 babies. The point of it is to murder as many defenceless children and adults as possible.

The laws do not deal with this at the moment. The petition signed by over 80 people from Saskatoon asks Parliament to consider amending the Criminal Code so that violent and degrading materials such as the serial killer board game can be kept from being distributed in Canada.

MENINGOCOCCAL DISEASE TEST KIT

Mr. Joe McGuire (Egmont): Mr. Speaker, I wish to join my colleague, the hon. member for Labrador, in presenting a petition concerning meningococcal disease which has taken the lives of many children in Canada.

I am reminded of the death of young Islanders to this dreaded disease that gives almost no warning and no time really for treatment. The government should do whatever it can at the Department of National Health and Welfare to make this kit available that tests all types of meningitis at its early stages.

The names on this petition are from Summerside, basically Prince and King's counties, Prince Edward Island. I encourage the government to respond very quickly to this petition.

NORTH AMERICAN FREE TRADE AGREEMENT
