LOWER VALUES IN CHICAGO MARKET

Chance of Damage by Black Rust Was the Cause.

CHICAGO, July 10.—Skepticism in regard to the chances of widespread damage by black rust brought about a lowering of values today in wheat.

Notwithstanding that hot weather northwest and bullish cables gave wheat prices some strength at the start, selling pressure enlarged to an unusual extent, and there was decided heaviness in consequence.

European demand for wheat was much less urgent than heretofore, and that foreign requirements were fairly well filled up for the present.
